HERE AND THERE.
Interesting Items Concerning Different Sections of the Region.
The Supreme Court, sitting at Philadelphia, awarded a verdict of \$5,000 for Mrs. Mary McHugh, of Shamokin, in her suit against the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, on whose road she sustained injuries of the most serious character.
Spirandix Cico and Pierre Luexio, Frenchmen, were seriously burned by a gas explosion at the Nielson shaft, Shamokin, Friday morning. Cico was sent to the Miners' Hospital and Luexio to his home in West Shamokin. Each man's face and hands received the most of the fire. A short time before the explosion Frank Shelle missed his footing in the Cameron mines and fell down a manway, receiving a number of cuts and bruises.
Eight hundred and twenty-five dollars was stolen from Rodarmel's Hotel at Port Trevorton, opposite Herndon, on Wednesday afternoon. The money was in a drawer in the office, and while the proprietor was out the drawer was pried open and the money taken. There is no clue to the thief.

County 'Round.
Preparations, on a very large scale, are being made for unveiling the soldiers' monument at Mahanoy City in September. Shenandoah will be well represented.
Ashland veterans of the late war will hold a Columbia tea party on July 4th.
There will be three good races on Decoration Day at Orwigburg. The first will be a running race, half-mile heats, best two in three; second, will be a gentlemen's road race to road carts, mile heats, best three in five; third will be a free for all trotters.

Girardville Schools.
It has been found necessary by the School Board of Girardville to introduce the system of graduating pupils from the High School. This course has been made necessary on account of the crowded condition of the schools, through the increase of population. Diplomas will be awarded to the nine pupils comprising the class of '92 at the commencement to be held at the Palace theatre at that place on Friday evening, May 27. The examinations were conducted by the principal, Col. P. H. Monaghan, and were most creditable. Miss Mary Quirk's average of 96 was the highest of the class. She was closely followed by Misses Helen Halay and Lizzie Gavin, whose averages were 95 each. The exercises will include the regular commencement features, together with a lecture by the Hon. Henry Houck, Deputy State Superintendent.

Rushing the Growler.
Complaints are being daily made to this office of prominent saloon keepers who violate the law by selling beer or ale to children by the pailful. This evil has grown to such awful proportions that something must be done. 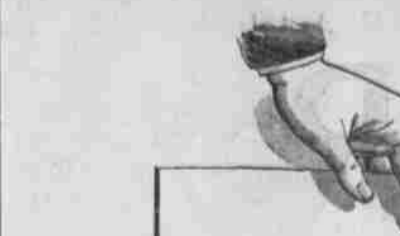

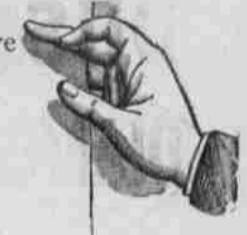
