#### THE ITALIAN

SHOOTING GASE.

THE MEN WHO DID THE SHOOT. ING FLED.

THEY ARE NOW BEYOND REAGH

Three Held for Trial and Sent to the County Jail-All the Victims are out of Danger. The Hearing Last Night.



IG Frank and the other Italian wanted held. for doing the shooting at the trotting park on Decoration Day have ski; ped, and the indiestions are that they will not become inmates of the Pottsville full. The authorities expected that the two

men would surrender themselves this morning, but it is now certain that they have gone. Yesterday afternoon Bis Frank's wife slipped out of town with her two children. She bought a ticket for Philadelphia.

Last night 'Squire Monaghan gave all the Italians under arrest another hearing. Several witnesses who were at work yesterday and could not attend the hearing at noon appeared and positively identified three of the Italians as being men who were in the crowd that did the shooting, but the testimony showed that the shooting was done by the men who are missing. Squire Monaghan held the three men identified and discharged the rest. The three who remain in custody were taken to Pottsville this morning.

The parties who were shot are out of danger. The Sadusky boy, Ringheiser and McAllister are confined to their homes and will probably be laid up for sometime. It is understood that Contractor Rickert

will see that the Italians under arrest will be properly represented in court. It is claimed in behalf of the Italians that boys and young men have been in the habit of running dumpers over the banks at the "strippings" and committing other depredations, and that the Italians were justified in defending the property.

HE spit-fire who sets as local correspondent for the Republican wrote yesterday: "It is hoped by many that the HERALD will not overlook the actions of Council yesterday, and give in its columns this evening a full account of the action of

the whole fitteen in their inspection of the town after the parade yesterday." He then proceeds to explain that the" whole fifteen' didn't inspect the town.

Had the Borough Council made an official inspection of the town the HERALD would have had a representative on hand to note what they did. It is true that "De Ate" drove about Monday afternoon, smoking cigars and conducted themselves generally in a manner that would impress a stranger with the belief that they were "the people." As with things done by "De Ate" the newspaper men-the little man on the string excepted-were not notified of the arrangements for the tour.
