AN EXACT COPY.

The Proposition Submitted to Council by the Old Water Company.
Many citizens have approached the officials of the Shenandoah Water and Gas Company, asking them why their company does not make some proposition to the Borough Council looking to the settlement of the existing trouble. Under these circumstances it is deemed wise to republish, for the benefit of those of our citizens who may not have read it, the proposition submitted by the old water company. The following is an exact copy as presented by the company to the Borough Council:

SHENANDOAH, PA., MAY 8, 1892.
To the President and Members of the Borough Council:
We hereby reassure you and the public at large that our offer heretofore made was given in good faith. We hereby repeat the proposition, viz: That the Water Company will accept the judgment obtained in the suit against the Borough, pay the costs of suit and waive its right to claim for water supplied. The Borough for fire purposes for the past two years, and give the Borough free water for fire protection; provided, the Borough abandons the proposed new water works, and that an agreement to that effect be entered into. The foregoing statement having been read and discussed, it was unanimously adopted by the Directors of said company.

Urging Further Pension Appropriation.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Gen. Baum, Commissioner of Pensions, again appeared before the House Committee on Appropriations, and urged the appropriation of \$7,000,000 to meet the deficiencies in pensions for the current fiscal year. He explained the estimate and urged that the money asked for be made available by June 10, so that the office can meet the next quarterly payment. If the amount is allowed it will make the total appropriation for the year nearly \$148,000,000.

PUBLIC NOTICE!

The public are hereby notified that the following provision of the Borough Ordinance will be strictly enforced:

ORDINANCE XVII.
SECTION 4.—That during the months of June, July, August and September of every year no dog nor bitch shall lawfully go at large within the borough of Shenandoah, unless such dog or bitch shall have a strong muzzle or shield of wire securely fastened over the nose of such dog or bitch, so as to prevent effectually any injury from biting; and any dog or bitch running at large in violation of the provisions of this section shall be disposed of as provided in section three (3) of this ordinance.

Section three (3) provides: That such dogs shall be immediately taken and impounded by the High Constable for a period of time not more than three days; due notice being given to the owner if he can be found, and if not then redeemed by the owners or owner, by the payment of the tax, (one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch), and a fee of fifty cents additional for expenses incurred, such dogs or bitches shall then be killed and buried.
