IT has been estimated by the free trade advocates that Germany, with her protective tariff, is furnishing more immigrants to America, a protective country, than is free trade England, and the question is asked why? The proposition is not correctly stated. The figures show exactly the contrary. During the year ending June 30, 1890, Germany sent to America alone 92,427 immigrants, while Great Britain, not including Wales, sent 128,340. This question was propounded by a leading advocate of "tariff reform" to a protectionist Republican during the debate in Congress to which no reply was given. The reply might have easily been found in the following statement : A comparison of the immigrants ariving please say "advertised." One cent will be in America from the two countries named above from 1815 to June 80, 1800, is as follows: Great Britain, 7.235,277 out of a population of 85,-000,000; while from Germrny there came 4,504,128 out of a population of 46,000,000. These figures speak for themselves.

The truth is now disclosed to the American people that the whole programme has been one of buncombe and pretense and was not in any particular a sincere project of legislation. The Democrats must either admit that or that their legislators are arrant fools.

THE silver plank of the Iowa Democrats is one of the most remarkable straddles on record. To make it mean anything and to harmonize with itself, at least one-half must be rejected, but which shall it be-the silver half or the gold half? As it stands now, it declares for free colunge, subject to such conditions and qualifications as would satisfy the most extreme gold monomentallists or "gold-bugs." Conversely it declares for such a monetary condition as cannot be maintained without a careful regulation and limitation of silver coinage. The Iowa Democrats may have some convictions on the coinage question, but they are booming Boies just now, and want to run with the hare and hunt with the hounds.

The public are hereby notified that the folwing provision of the Borough Ordinanc will be strictly enforced:

ORDINANCE XVII. ORDINANCE XVII.

SECTION 4.—That during the months of June, July, August and September of every year no log nor bitch shall lawfally go at large within the borough of Shenandosh, unless such dog or bitch shall have a strong muzzle or shield of wire securely fastened over the nose of such dog or bitch, so as to prevent effectually any njury from hiting, and any bitch or dog running at large is violation of the provisions of this section there (3) of this ordinance.

Section three (3) provides: That such dogs "Shall be immediately taken and impounded by the High Constable for a period of time not more than three days, due notice being given to the owner if he can be found, and it not then redeemed by the owners or owner, by the payment of the tax, (one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch), and a foe of fifty cents additional for expenses incurred, such dogs or bitches shall then be killed and buried.
