They argue that the offer is not sufficiently binding, yet they feel warranted in asking the people for \$95,000 on the mere statement of an Individual, whose mane they refuse to disclose, that the works can be established for that amount.

BEWARE of the fake that by voting for the increase of debt the people will place themselves in a position that will enable them to dictate terms for the purchase of the water company's plant. The truth is, that if the people place \$95,000 in the hands of the joint committee that committee will take the ground it has always maintained -that the mass meeting directed that public water works be established and no question of compromise or purchase can be considered. If the people don't want public water works they should vote squarely against the increase of debt and not leave anything at the discretion of the joint committee, or the combined eight members of Council. There are too many on the joint committee and in Council who have staked the hope of a life on the establishment of the proposed public water works to warrant any expectation of a compromise of any form after the people place \$95,000 at their disposal.

THERE are many people in town who have been "on the fence" in the water controversy because they did not know whether the offer of the water company would remain in force in case the people should vote against the increase of debt. All doubts in this connection are dispelled by the resolution adopted by the water company on the 3rd inst., and given to the people over the signatures of the officers and directors of the company.

Three Hundred People Homeless at Titus ville-Robbing the Sufferers.

Tirusville, Pa., June 8.—J. J. Van-dergrift, John Eston, and George Herd came to Titusville from Oil City yesterday and met the Relief Committee here. It was decided that half of the territory between the two cities above OH Creek

be taken by each and the flood and fire sufferers cared for.

For this purpose it was decided that \$100,000 was necessary to provide for the mmediate wants of the sufferers in the Titusville district and an equal amount was necessary for the Oil City district. Three hundred people in the three acres of the burned district in Titus-

ville are homeless and dependent.
The Standard Oil Company has co tributed \$25,000 to Titusville and Oll

Railroads, private dwellings, refineries

Railroads, private dwellings, refineries and factories of all kinds are among the buildings destroyed.

The amount of territory devastated here covers fully two miles.

The militia has been called out to put a stop to the thieving going on throughout the city. The homeless sufferers had much of their valuable property, which had been saved from the flood, atored away in railroad cars in various parts of the town.

Soveral attempts have been made by gauge of men to break into the cars and

gauge of men to break into the cars and rifle them. A number of arrests have been made. Some of the malefactors escaped rough treatment at the hands of the citizens only because of the efforts made by the officers in charge of them. The dead list here is on the road to 200,

A great part of the burned region has not yet been touched by the searchers, Concerted efforts to render assistance to the homeless and destitute are making on the part of all, but many things are needed for the successful prosecution of the work of relief which cannot be furnished by the people of the city in their present hampered condition.
