### THE CIRCULAR REPUDIATED.

Councilman Scheiffy Did Not Sign the Joint Committee's "Stump Speech." The appearance of Councilman J. K. P. Scheiffy's name to the joint committee's circular issued on Friday, and again to the address issued on Saturday by a number of citizens, was sufficiently anomalous to create some comment on the streets Saturday and yesterday. The two papers were so diametrically opposed to each other that people said they could not see how Scheiffy could straddle them both any more than he could ride two horses going in opposite directions.

A HERALD reporter saw Mr. Scheiffy this morning and asked him how he explained the matter.

"Very easily," said the Councilman. "I did not sign the circular issued by the joint committee. Neither did I authorize any person to sign it for me. I did sign the address issued by the citizens and endorse the sentiments expressed in it."

"But, Mr. Scheiffy," the reporter said, "you are a member of the joint committee, are you not?"

"Yes, a nominal member," he said, "but I have never been an active member of that committee."

The reporter intimated that he didn't quite understand the distinction, and then Mr. Scheiffy explained:

"When you understand how I was appointed and the manner in which I was afterwards treated by the other members of the committee, you will understand why I am but a nominal member."

"When present Council was organized," he went on, "the eight members who controlled the organization agreed among themselves to increase the Council's committee on new water works to eight members, and to appoint themselves. The purpose of this, you will perceive, was quite obviously to put the control of Council into the hands of the joint water committee. When the time came to increase the committee the motion was regularly made and authority to name the committee given to President James of Council. Mr. James carried out the programme of his faction by appointing seven of the eight members as members of the water committee, but didn't have the nerve and courage of law and usages to appoint himself. He then appointed me as the eighth member of the committee, but it was plain to everybody present that he did so only because his faction in Council lacked the tact to first offer a resolution making the president of Council an *ex officio* member of the committee."

"To prove that I am right," he said, "it is only necessary to say that Mr. James was subsequently elected a member of the joint committee, so that he is to all intents and purposes a member of the Council's committee on new water works."

"Have you ever attended any meetings of the committee?" the reporter asked him.

"Yes," he said, "I have attended such meetings as I have had notice of, but they were very few, and there was very little business transacted in my presence. I never could get the inside workings of the committee, and there was a studied purpose on the part of those on the inside to keep me and the public in ignorance of its doings."

"Do you indorse the circular issued by the joint committee?" was the next question he was asked.

"No; nor the methods of the committee," he said. "I believe that all public business should be transacted in public, and I believe that if the movement to establish a borough water works was inspired by a desire to benefit the public, there would have been no necessity for transacting the business of the committee in secret sessions. I am in favor of any thing that has for its object the advancement of the interests of the town and its people, but I am not in favor of bamboozling the public, and I have no sympathy with a movement that has for its object the taxing of the people for the benefit of a few speculators, and the creation of offices for a little horde of persistent office-seekers."

"I might also add," said Mr. Scheiffy, as the reporter was about to depart, "that I have had some correspondence with the manufacturers of pumps, engines and water pipes, and have been able to get no information or prices that will justify the belief that a plant such as is proposed will not cost at least twice as much as the estimate of the committee."

"I have also," he said, "consulted several engineers and find that the item of fuel alone would cost at least five times as much as the committee's estimate for that item of operating expense, or not less than ten to twelve tons of coal a day."

Mother Elizabeth is about seventy-five years old, and is the last surviving founder of the Order of Mercy Sisterhood in the United States.

### The King of the Rustlers Killed.

RED LODGE, Mont., June 13.—A letter from Arland, Wyo., says that Jack Bliss, the King of the Rustlers, was killed on June 1 on the South Fork of Stinking Water Creek by Deputy Sheriff Fray of this place and a posse. Bliss was barricaded in a stone fortress, twenty-three miles from a mining camp, and supplied himself with food by pillaging miners' cabins. The officers took him unawares.

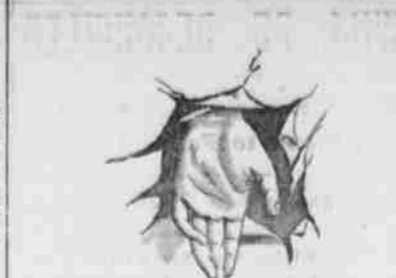

## PUBLIC NOTICE! FREE EXAMINATIONS!

The public are hereby notified that the following provision of the Borough Ordinance will be strictly enforced: ORDINANCE XVII.

SECTION 4.—That during the months of June, July, August and September of every year no dog nor bitch shall lawfully go at large within the borough of Shenandoah, unless such dog or bitch shall have a strong muzzle or shield of wire securely fastened over the nose of such dog or bitch, so as to prevent effectually any injury from biting.

Section three (3) provides: That such dogs "shall be immediately taken and impounded by the High Constable for a period of time not more than three days; due notice being given to the owner if he can be found, and if not then redeemed by the owners or owner, by the payment of the tax, (one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch), and a fee of fifty cents additional for expenses incurred, such dogs or bitches shall then be killed and buried.
