ORDINANCE XVII.

SECTION 4—That during the months of June, July, August and September of every year no dog nor bitch shall lawfully go at large within the borough of Shenandosh, unless such dog or bitch shall have a strong innexte or shield of wire securely fastened over the nose of such dog or bitch, so as to prevent effectually any lajury from biting:

and any bitch or dor running at large in violation of the provisions of this section shall be disposed of as provided in section three (3) of this ordinance.

Section three (3) provides: That such dogs shall be immediately taken and impounded by the High Constable for a period of time not more than three days; due notice being given to the owner if he can be found, and if not then redeemed by the owners or owner, by the payment of the tax, (one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch, and a fee of lifty cents additional for expenses incurred, such dogs or bitches shall then be killed and burled.
