THE READING'S SUITS.

Peculiar Relationship of Counsel in the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Litigation.

In the attempt being made to set aside the Reading leases, the following editorial, taken from the Easton Free Press of June 7, shows the peculiar and close connection and relationship existing between the special counsel engaged by the state of New Jersey to assist in the litigation instituted by the Attorney General of that state and the complainants in this bill in equity recently filed in the Common Pleas of Northampton county, at Easton, Pa.:

"The suit brought in our Northampton County Court on Saturday, against the Lehigh Valley and Philadelphia and Reading Railroad companies, growing out of the Reading lease, has given rise to considerable speculation in the direction of cause or motive upon which light can be thrown by one or two reflections of a historical character.

"The plaintiffs are Elizabeth S. Gummere, Hugh N. Hammill and others, mainly of Trenton, N. J. Mr. Hammill is a clergyman and the son-in-law of Barker Gummere, one of the counsel of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company at Trenton. Elizabeth S. Gummere is the wife of Barker Gummere. Mr. Hammill was also guardian of John D. Hoes and Isabella D. Hoes, minors. The Hoes are the grandchildren of Abbel Welsh, formerly president of the United Railroads of New Jersey. In other words, the action is a scarcely veiled attack, through the courts, of the great rival upon its neighbor, the Reading. The policy outlined by Mr. Cassatt in his celebrated interview, when the leases were announced, is being steadily pressed.

"The people would have an intelligent conception of the animus of this strange suit if the position of the Pennsylvania Railroad was acknowledged and not hidden. It purports to be a suit brought by stockholders of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company to set aside the lease, and prays for a receiver of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, a seemingly anomalous proceeding for a stockholder to take, inasmuch as the lease guarantees a minimum dividend of seven per cent., and the company is reported to be earning more than it earned at the same period of last year, and its stock is now selling in the market at about twenty per cent. higher than it sold before the lease."

PREFERRED DEATH TO SUFFERING.

Suicide of Dr. Terry, the Well-Known Philadelphia Physician.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 14.—Rather than live afflicted with disease which he knew was incurable and entailed long suffering, Dr. Isaac C. Terry, a well-known physician, blew his brains out shortly after 7 a. m.

Dr. Terry was 56 years old, and resided alone with his aged colored servant. The servant went up to the second-story front room occupied by the physician to notify him that his breakfast was ready. No sooner had he left the room and reached the bottom of the stairs than he heard a pistol shot, and running back, found the physician lying on the bed with blood oozing from his mouth.

Dr. Terry had taken a revolver, which he kept in his room, and placing the barrel in his mouth, pulled the trigger. Death was almost instantaneous.

Says the Swindler Is Not His Son.

BOSTON, June 14.—Mr. Joshua Benahol of this city says the man arrested in Fall River charged with attempting to defraud New York and Boston banks is not his son, as was asserted by the prisoner Mr. Benahol feels confident that the book marked "J. Benahol's" found in the arrested man's pocket gives his true name, and says he is the son of Hadji Ephraim Bengulat, an estimable man, an importer of antique decorations and rugs in this place, and with a summer place of business at Newport, R. I.

PUBLIC NOTICE!

FREE EXAMINATIONS!

The public are hereby notified that the following provision of the Borough Ordinance will be strictly enforced:

ORDINANCE XVII. SECTION 4.—That during the months of June, July, August and September of every year no dog or bitch shall lawfully go at large within the borough of Shenandoah, unless such dog or bitch shall have a strong muzzle or shield of wire securely fastened over the nose of such dog or bitch, so as to prevent effectually any injury from biting; and any bitch or dog running at large in violation of the provisions of this section shall be disposed of as provided in section three (3) of this ordinance.

Section three (3) provides: That such dogs shall be immediately taken and impounded by the High Constable for a period of time not more than three days; due notice being given to the owner if he can be found, and if not then redeemed by the owners or owner, by the payment of the tax (one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch), and a fee of fifty cents additional for expenses incurred, such dogs or bitches shall then be killed and buried.
