window to keep herself from falling into five feet of water.

Mrs. McHugh, one of the wealthiest and oldest women in Mahanoy City, was rescued by E. A. Griffith. Like Mrs. Allen, Mrs. McHugh was unable to flee to a place of safety before the water was almost up to her shoulders. She, too, was found in a basement of a North Main building.

Mrs. Harrison Derrick and "Granny" Wilcox, two other aged ladies, had similar experiences.

The Borough Council of Mahanoy City held a meeting this morning and requested the water company to have all the logs, stumps and other debris deposited on the streets by the flood removed. The company said it was not responsible for the expense of such work, as the bursting of the dam had occurred under circumstances over which the company had no control. The borough at once put its own force on the work and it is understood, will charge the water company with the expense.

General Manager R. C. Luther and other officials of the P. & R. Company arrived here at an early hour this morning and put several gangs of navies at work repairing tracks, and it was announced at noon that both roads would be ready for operations to-night.
