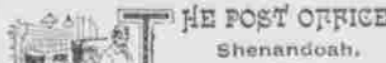

To send an alarm open the box, pull down the hook once and let go. When an alarm is sent in the fire bell will sound the number of the box and repeat the alarm four times.

HOW TO LOCATE ALARMS.
If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike one, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.

CHILDRENS' DAY IN THE M. E. CHURCH

THE EDIFICE WAS ELABORATELY DECORATED.

PLANTS AND FLOWERS ABUNDANT

The Pastor of the Church Delivers a Very Appropriate Sermon to the Children "Ye Are the Light."



UNDAY was observed as Children's day at the Methodist Episcopal church. The decorations were elaborate yet chaste and reflected great credit upon the committee in charge of the work.

In the background of the pulpit recess was a lighthouse to represent the light of the world. On either side was an anchor and a cross emblematic of the christian's hope and its foundation. Between them, and surrounding a rockery, was a beautiful pillar of roses and lilies upon which a dove with outstretched wings was perched bearing the olive branch of peace, typical of reconciliation with God and the purity which follows. These were supplemented with blooming plants, banks of roses and daisies, bouquets, etc., tastefully arranged to present the most pleasing effect.

At the morning service the pastor delivered an appropriate sermon to the children from the text: "Ye are the light of the world." The lighthouse was used as an object lesson to enforce the teaching of the hour. Light means talk. Jesus himself is the light of the world, and we, like the moon, shine in borrowed rays. In our sphere we are to be miniature Christ's—moral lighthouses—God's truth bearers and life givers. Upon our dangerous coasts are lighthouses exhibiting different kinds of lights which are striking reminders of different kinds of Christians. There are single and double lights, white and colored, fixed, flash and revolving—so in the christian world. The most useful people are those whose light shines steadily. Lightening is very vivid but it is not best for illuminating the storm tossed traveler. It rends the heavens and for an instant the glory of God seems to flash through the rent only to make the darkness more intense. So some people shine with dazzling splendor for a little while and then they are no more. They may attract more attention but they are less useful than the humble child of God whose light shines less brilliantly but more constantly.

In the evening an original programme was well rendered in the presence of an overflowing assemblage. There were recitations by Misses Helen Price, Emma Gunter and Master Eugene Titman; a reading by Miss Birdie Wasley; duets by Misses Birdie Newbouser and Lulu Waters, Belle Brown and Mary Hooks, Gertie Wright and Sadie Lingham; quartettes by Messrs. Hughes, Moran, Crobaugh and Price, and by Messrs. Price, Crobaugh and Misses Morgan and Williams. Selections were also rendered by the different departments of the school and an address was delivered by the pastor.

Children's Day Was Appropriately Observed There Yesterday.

Children's day was appropriately observed in the Primitive Methodist church yesterday by the rendering of a service of song entitled, "Little Crusaders," by the scholars, assisted by the choir. Several recitations were given by the scholars with good effect and the choir sang some very pretty anthems. Pastor Proude gave a short but excellent address on the important part that children take in life and the necessity of training them with care. The decorations were really beautiful and consisted of a pair of Golden Gates Ajar, revealing a splendid collection of plants in the background. On the top of the gates was the text "Suffer the Little Children to Come Unto Me" and the massive side walls were represented by screens covered with laurel leaves. In front of the gates were two beautiful ships, and over all was the motto, "Welcome." Several canaries added to the music of the evening. Great praise is due to Marshall Baugh and corps of workers for their labors to make the day a success, and judging by the congregation that filled the church afternoon and evening they succeeded.

CURRENT EVENTS COMMENTED UPON

MORE CHANGES IN THE RUNNING OF TRAINS.

THEY KEEP TO THE RIGHT NOW

Many of the Railroad Tracks Destroyed by the Mahanoy City Flood Repaired—All Trains Running.



RAILROAD changes under the new Reading system are still going on. The latest went into effect on the local branch of the Lehigh Valley division this morning. Heretofore all trains of that division between Quakake and Green Ridge have been taking the left hand tracks, while the trains on all other branches, including all lines of the Reading, Lehigh Valley and Jersey Central, have taken the right hand tracks. The system is now uniform throughout and all trains keep to the right.

Under this change west bound trains take on passengers at the local depot from the platform, while passengers east bound must cross the tracks to get on the trains. There was some confusion at the depot this morning on account of the unexpected change, but the public will become acquainted with the reversed order of things in a day or two.

All the east bound trains on the local division of the Lehigh Valley road are now running on regular schedule time, the tracks that were destroyed on the Mahanoy-Delano branch by the bursting of the dam having been repaired. The upper tracks are not yet in condition and consequently all passenger, freight and coal trains run between this town and Delano via the Mahanoy City route.

A well known resident of Mahanoy City was in town to-day and, in conversation relative to the flood, said that he thought the people who are speculating upon recovering heavy damages from the water company that owns the dam that caused the flood will "slip up on it." He compares the bursting of the Mahanoy City dam with the Conemaugh disaster. "In the Conemaugh case," said he, "it was shown that the dam was not properly built, but no one succeeded in recovering a cent of damages from the owners. Suppose the other dam was not properly constructed, what better claim have the Mahanoy City people to damages than the Conemaugh people had? Another thing, the people who are complaining and crying out for damages are not the real sufferers. Most of them are people who do not own even chicken coops and are making claims to satisfy a feeling of prejudice they have against the water company."

Speaking about home investors reminds me of the expressions of a town gentleman Saturday night. He said: "This brewery boom makes me sick. Why if the establishment of such a thing is dependent upon the establishment of public water works we have plenty time to consider over the matter before we ensue. The contracts for water works have not been advertised for and a year must certainly elapse between the commencement and completion of the works, hence the brewers who are now supplying the town will have ample opportunity to arrange a price for the beverage that will cause the brewery boomers to put on their thinking caps. I believe in home industries and am prepared to give them all encouragement, but they must have a bona fide appearance. If these brewery people were sincere they could have put the project on foot years ago, before the Mahanoy City people thought of having a brewery."

The State Board of Health issues a timely circular on precautions against cholera infantum. The circular states continued high temperature, night and day, appears to be the essential cause of the disease. It is important, therefore, first: To keep the child cool, and, secondly, to keep its food (milk) cool. To accomplish the first object, allow the baby to drink freely of cool (not excessively cold) water; bathe it frequently in cool or lukewarm water, two or three times a day if the thermometer is above 90°; keep it in the open air in the shade; take it into the country or out on the water as often as possible. Let it wear a very thin undershirt, or if not this, a flannel belly-band. To accomplish the second get pure milk, keep as little on hand as possible—and keep it on ice if possible. As soon as you get it, boil it for a few minutes and then add a tablespoonful of lime water to every pint. If the child is seized suddenly with diarrhoea stop its milk at once, and feed it on raw white of egg, gelatine, barley water, and meat or chicken broth; and do not give it milk again until the diarrhoea has stopped.

Interesting Items Concerning Different Sections of the Region.

It is reported that the Lehigh Valley Coal Company's offices which were moved to Philadelphia on May 1, will be removed to Bethlehem on July 1.

The Bethlehem Times says "the wholesale prices of coal to the local dealers have been further advanced 10 and 15 cents per month. The advances on the different grades of coal since February 1st last amount to from 15 to 45 cents per ton. On chestnut coal the price has been advanced 30 cents per ton since that time.

Conductors under the Reading system have been notified that they will not be allowed to carry watches that vary more than 30 seconds in a week.

The wholesale grocers, provision dealers and oil houses of Wilkes-Barre announce that they will close their places of business Saturday afternoons at 3 o'clock until September 15, in observance of the half holiday law.

Work has been commenced on the foundations for the new P. O. S. of A. hall to be erected in Ashland.

Dr. J. C. Biddle, of the Miners' Hospital, will start on July 10th for a two-month European trip.

Pigeon thieves are bothering Ashland people.

Suits for damages have been entered against the P. & R. by the heirs of the victims whose deaths were caused by the explosion of the mogul engine No. 596 on the 28th of January last, above St. Clair. It will be remembered that Engineer Joseph Zeigler, Port Carbon; Fireman Napoleon Paul, Palo Alto; Brakemen Henry Sands, Edward Winterstein, Port Carbon; and Jacob Turner, St. Clair, lost their lives in this explosion.

It is said the Butler township school district will this year follow in the footsteps of the Shenandoah School Board by giving home people preference in appointment of school teachers.

At a meeting of the First National Bank of Orwigsburg, John A. Grant, of Shenandoah, was elected to membership vice John K. Leisenring resigned.

The Democratic County Convention will meet in Pottsville on Monday, July 12th, for the purpose of nominating a county ticket.
