



FLOOD ECHOES.

Notes Concerning Visitors to the Flooded

Many of the Railroad Tracks Destroyed by the Mahanoy City Flood Repaired-All Trains Running.



ween Quakake and Green Ridge have cen taking the left hand tracks, while the ains on all other branches, including all ines of the Reading, Lahigh Valley and lersey Central, have taken the right hand racks. The system is now uniform broughout and all trains keep to the right. 2,2

Interesting Items Concerning Different Sections of the Region

It is reported that the Lehigh Valley. bal Company's offices which were moved to Philadelphia on May 1, will be removed to Bethlehem on July 1.

The Bethlebern Trace says "the wholesale prices of coal to the local dealers have been further advanced 10 and 15 cents per month. The advances on the different grades of coal since February 1st last amount to from 15 to 45 cents per ton. On chestnut coal the price has been advanced. 30 cents per ton since that time.

Conductors under the Reading system have been notified that they will not be allowed to carry watches that vary more than 30 seconds in a week.

The wholesale grocers, provision dealers and oil houses of Wilkes-Barre announce that they will close their places of business Saturday afternoons at 3 o'clock until September 15, in observance of the half toliday law.
