ANOTHER DAM

GAUSES TROUBLE

THE KAUFFMAN DAM ABOVE ST. CLAIR.

FLEEING TO THE MOUNTAINS

A Dangerous Leak Discovered in the Dam Causes a Panic-At Last Accounts the Crisis Was Over.



ERRO3 struck the hearts of the people of town yesterday when they heard that the breast work of Kauffman's dam was show ing signs of weakening

and a flood threstened the people of St. Clair and Port Carbon. The residents of town who have relatives and friends at those places are numerous, I ence the report was received here with almost the same feeling that would have prevailed if Shenandosh was threatened by a flood.

Telegrams of inquiry flashed over the wires constantly and everybody who arrived in town from Frackville was questioned closely as to the condition of the dam, whether it had burst or would burst, and how the people of St. Clair and Port Carbon were. Many people remained upon the streets until after midnight to glean information.

The report of the expected outbreak was first given out at noon yesterday. The dam was then leaking so badly that the destruction of the dam seemed inevitable. The people of St. Clair became panic stricken and fled to the neighboring hills and there they sat until night expecting to see their homes swept away by a torrent from the dam.

As soon as the Pottsville people were made acquainted with the condition of affairs they at once made preparations for the relief of the St. Clair people and supplied them with food and lodgings. Arrangements were also made for a system of warping signals in case the dam should give way. Company K, Eighth Regiment, was called out for duty and the men were stationed above and below St. Clair in such a manner that by the discharge of their guns they could warn the people of the crisis. It was also arranged that in such an event the people who remained in St. Clair would be warned by the whistle at the old shaft. These arrangements remained in force to-day.

A HERALD reporter visited the dam at 2 clock this morning and found seated about a huge bonfire Messrs. Drumheller, Barker, Pollard, Russell and Morton, gentlemen interested in the Pottsville Water Company, owners of the dam, Superintendent Kalbach and Supervisor Turk. Dr. D. W. For hours the decrease was three inches an hour, When the HERALD man arrived upon the scene (2 s. m.) the officials estimated that 40 000 000 gallons had been drawn off and measurements taken at that hour showed that the decrease for the preceding hour and a half was four and a quarter inches.

When asked about the prospects Mr. Barker said, "We can say nothing definite, We are doing all in our power to get the water out. Matters are beginning to look brighter and there seems to be a decrease in the leak. The open twelve-inch pipes are taking water steadily, but whether the breast will hold out until we can get the water to a safe level we are not prepared to We have hopes that it will."

The reduction of water in the dam continues favorably and, although the opening at 5:30 a. m., daily, and every 25 minutes where the leak is seems larger than it was, thereafter until midnight, at which hour it is believed the dam will not give way.

AN ELECTRIC RAILWAY CANARD

A Malicious Bogus Report of the Company's Projects Effectually Quashed-A Groundless Story Nailed.

een given a lease of life for 50 years. The railway will extend from Cammel station, on the Pine Creek Railway in Lycoming county, this state, to Silver Springs, in McHenry township, same county.

The railway will be used for freight and passenger traffic and will be eight miles ong. The capital stock is \$80 000, divided into 1,600 shares of \$50 each.

The railway does not take its name from the states of Oregon and Texas, but from two places in Lycoming county.

ONLY A CANARD.

Malicious Reports Concerning the Electric Ratiway squesched.

The Evening Telegram of Ashland last vening published the following article: "Last evening the Telegram published

in article taken from the Shenandoah Sunday News, and based on an article that appeared in the last issue of the Girardville Gazette to the effect that those in power al decided against building the Ashland-Girardville, and Girardville - Mahanoy Plane branches of the Shenandoan, Mahanoy City, Girardville and Ashland Electric Railway.

"The article created considerable comment last evening, and gave the best possible evidence of the fact that our people are alive to the needs of this railway, and stand ready by all the means in their power to farther its progress.

"The Telegram to-day is pleased at being able to announce that the report is a canard, that had absolutely no foundation in fact whatever. Judge Sadler, the head and shoulders of the new company, arrived in Shenandoah on Friday, and expects to make that place his headquarters until eptember, and in the meanume he will do all in his power to advance the road to the points above mentioned.

"He expresses himself as highly pleased with the result already attained, though he greatly regrets that untoward circumstances have prevented the construction of the road as rapidly as was at first expected. Difficulty after difficulty was met in the construction of the Shenandoah-Girardville branch, and were overcome, and that branch is paying beyond all expectation, and the management are now considering the point of increasing the equipment of the line in order to meet the public demand for rapid and commodious transit.

"Those in the inner circle say that there a is no doubt whatever of the disputed branches being constructed, and that speedily. We are glad to know it; feel sure that our people will heartily welcome the approach of the construction crew, and still more heartily, the cars when they come.1
