### THE GIRARD CADETS.

Their Annual Excursion to-morrow to Visit Girardville.

The cadets of Girard College, Philadelphia, will have their annual excursion to-morrow and have selected Girardville as the visiting point. They will breakfast at the college to-morrow morning, at 6:30, and half an hour later leave the institution. At 7 a. m. they will leave Girard avenue station (P. & R. R.) and their 117 mile journey will end at Girardville at 10:04 a. m.

The cadets will be received by company F, 8th Regiment, N. G. P., Capt. E. C. Wagner, commanding. The address of welcome will be made by Col. P. H. Munnaghan and the response will be made by Prof. A. H. Fetterolf, L. L. D., President of Girard College. At 11:30 a. m. the cadets will dine. At 1:30 p. m. they will take Electric Railway cars to the Hammond Colliery and Water Level Drift, and the breaker. At 4 p. m. there will be a drill, dress parade and review; at 5 p. m. supper will be served in the Armory; and at 6 p. m. the cadets will leave Girardville for home, where they will be due at 9:30 p. m.

The cadets have four companies, a band of 27 musicians, and a drum corps of ten. Colonel Joseph R. C. Ward is in command. The cadets were organized at Girard College on August 31, 1870. The officers number 31, men 226, at total of 257, including the band and drum corps.

### A NOVEL SCHEME.

A Plan to Have Co-operative Accommodations at Chicago.

A number of people in this town, Mahanoy City, Girardville and Ashland are talking of organizing a club to make preparations toward viewing the World's fair next year with comfort and pleasure. This comfort and pleasure they feel that they cannot obtain from an ordinary visit to Chicago, where they would be compelled to submit to small, cramped apartments, crowded hotels, coarse food and many other annoyances; therefore they propose to make their visit far from ordinary. They will rent a large furnished house in a locality in the neighborhood of the Exposition grounds, and there, with their cooks and waiters, their comfort will be perfect.

It is proposed to lease a house for, say six months, and put a competent male in charge and those who are members, with proper credentials, will be accommodated at any time they may visit Chicago during the period for which the house is rented.

In order to place this novel idea on a working basis it is proposed that the club be formed as soon as possible and a rate of subscriptions to be paid at certain intervals up to the opening of the fair, the total amount to be used as a guarantee or indemnity fund for the season's expenses.

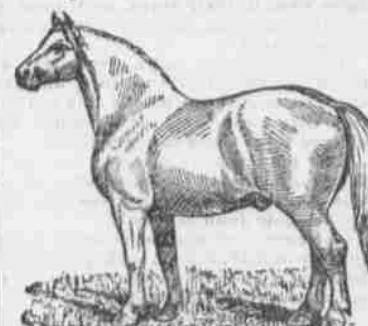
