AGAINST CLEVELAND.

Conrad L. Niehoff, the banker, has been a Democrat for thirty six years, and thinks that Cleveland's nomination means the defeat of the Democratic party. "They have nominated Cleveland. Now let them elect him," said Mr. Niehoff. "They cannot do it. I am a Hill man, in that I oppose all Mugwumps. No mixtures for me. Cleveland can't carry New York or Indiana, the pivotal states. Harrison can do it easily against the Democratic nominee. He carried New York in 1888, and he will in 1892. Had the convention adjourned without nominating Wednesday night, Cleveland would have been beaten. I do not like his civil service reform business, and his appointments in Chicago and also in New York were unsatisfactory to most people. The Republicans will have an easy time winning this year."

VETERANS AT GETTYSBURG.

Half Fares to the G. A. R. Encampment via Reading Railroad. In conformance with their custom, the veteran soldiers of Pennsylvania will encamp upon the historic battlefield of Gettysburg, July 24 to 28th. Stevenson's home in Bloomington, Ill., and convey the information of his selection as Vice-President to him.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 25.—Carter, the Yale catcher, who was disabled by a blow, received from Halliwell of Harvard, is in a critical condition at the Hotel Vendome, Boston. He has been insane ever since the accident, and the physicians are fearful, lest the injury result in a serious case of congestion of the brain. Ridgway, one of Yale's substitutes, and a trained nurse, is in attendance. Carter's parents have been summoned and are on their way to Boston.

He was about 70 years of age, and was at one time editor of the Litchfield "Enquirer." During the administration of President Cleveland Bills was post-master of Litchfield.

Not Enough Evidence Against Gibson.

CHICAGO, June 25.—The last act in the alleged conspiracy to blow up the Schuff Distillery was concluded in Judge Hutchins' Court, when the only remaining indictment against George J. Gibson, the ex-secretary of the Whiskey Trust was not pressed on motion of the State Attorney, who stated that the evidence was insufficient to convict.

Too Young to Be Punished.

PHILADELPHIA, June 25.—Because of his youth Frank Kline, aged 8 years escaped punishment for pushing Jacob Marsch, jr., of the same age, off Green street wharf into the Delaware River on Tuesday, and causing his death. Coroner Ashbridge held an inquest and the jury rendered a verdict of accidental death.
