PUBLIC NOTICE!

The public are hereby notified that the following provision of the Borough Ordinance will be strictly enforced:

ORDINANCE XVII.
SECTION 4.—That during the months of June, July, August and September of every year no dog or bitch shall lawfully go at large within the borough of Shenandoah, unless such dog or bitch shall have a strong muzzle or shield of wire securely fastened over the nose of such dog or bitch, so as to prevent effectually any injury from biting, possess, hold, convey and any bitch or dog running at large in violation of the provisions of this section shall be liable for the same as provided in section three of this ordinance.

Section three (3) provides: That such dogs shall be immediately taken and impounded by the High Constable for a period of time not more than three days; due notice being given to the owner if he can be found, and if not then reduced by the owner or other, by the payment of the tax, (one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch), and a fee of fifty cents additional for expenses incurred, such dogs or bitches shall then be killed and buried.
