THE BLIND MAN DEPARTS.

He Expects to Open a Hotel at Perth Amboy.

Thomas Holden, better known as "the blind man," has sold his saloon and all other property he owned in Brownsville and yesterday left for Perth Amboy, where he will open a hotel. It is said that Holden left here with about \$8,000 in cash and still owns a valuable property in town.

Holden lost his sight in the mines several years ago and as a means of livelihood he started selling liquor. The United States authorities pounced upon him for selling without a license and he was taken to Philadelphia. He got off with a fine. About two years ago he was arrested by the county authorities for selling beer without license. He served six months. His wife was next arrested and later on Holden himself was again arrested.

Mrs. Holden said in "Squire Shoemaker's office yesterday, "We have built a house in Perth Amboy and can get along better there than here. If we remained the chances are they would put us in jail again before the close of the summer."

CHEAP TRIP TO NEW YORK.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., July 7.—A sad accident occurred in No. 5 mine of the Lehigh & Wilkesbarre Coal Company last evening. Six engineers entered the mine to make a survey. They had just taken up their position in a breast when the roof fell upon them. Three of the men were killed outright.

Cholera Increasing in St. Petersburg.

St. PETERSBURG, July 7.—The number of cases of cholera is increasing in this city. Ninety-one deaths from the disease have been reported at Baka. The Turkish authorities have issued stringent orders to have the Russian frontier guarded against encroachments of the disease, which orders have been literally obeyed.

Floods Near New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, July 7.—The Sarpy crevasse is caving rapidly at the lower end and is now fully 1,500 feet wide. The flood is now less than ten miles above New Orleans, being close to the telephone station in the town of Konner.

Death of Prof. Lyman.

CHICAGO, July 7.—Prof. Walter C. Lyman, the veteran teacher of elocution and originator of the vocal instrument system bearing his name, is dead from Bright's disease. Walter C. Lyman was born in Geneva, N. Y., in 1837, and was the son of a Presbyterian minister. After the death of his father Prof. Lyman left Geneva for New York City, where he opened a school for elocution. In 1875 he gave up his prosperous school in New York and came to Chicago.

Ravachol's Accomplishes Sentenced.

PARIS, July 7.—The anarchist, Reala, convicted of complicity with Ravachol in having sheltered him, after the murder of the hermit, Chamblais, and of having received a portion of the money taken from the murdered man, has been sentenced to imprisonment for one year. The girl Sonnera, also convicted of aiding Ravachol to evade justice was sentenced to one month's imprisonment.
