

They Reliterate That Non-Union Men Will Not be Allowed in the Mill.

HOMESTRAD, Pa., July 14 .- A delegation of workmen from the Duquesne Mills of the Carnegie Company visited Homestead in the afternoon and had a conference with members of the Advisory Committee of the workmen. The strikers were as-

sured that the Duquesne men were ready to go out at any time and only awaited the word of the Homestead Advisory Com-mittee. This offer, coupled with the re-port of proposed strikes of men in the 29th and 38d street mills in Pittsburg and those at Braddock gave measurement to the at Braddock, gave encouragement to the workmen.

In conversation with a prominent mem-ber of the Advisory Committee in the afternoon a "United Press" reporter called attention to the intimation by Mr. Love-joy of the Carnagie Company that non-union men would be placed in the Home-

"Oh, he won't do that; people have heard him talk before," said the Advisory Committeeman. "But nearly everybody thinks he will,"

"But nearly everybody tonks as with said the reporter. "Well, if he attempts that," was the answer, "there will be lots of news for you. We are determined not to allow non-union men in the mill, and will keep to our determination without regard to the consequences."
