AT LAKESIDE.
Interesting Report From the Evangelical Association Camp Meeting.

LAKESIDE, July 20.—The day dawned bright and clear, and in a circle of forty-one tents which compose the camp Rev. D. Medlar, presiding elder of the Pottsville district, with his able corps, were given to the duties before them. Early in the morning a new tabernacle was consecrated, followed by prayer meeting and class. This was a spiritual feast to the soul.

At 10 a. m. Rev. R. M. Lichtenwalder, of Shenandoah, opened service in German. His text was Phil. III; 12 followed by Rev. Woffel, of Shamokin, in the English language. These services were well attended.

Rev. Longdorf, of Lansford, preached from a passage of Scripture found in Acts XVI, 9 to 13. He dwelt mainly upon the attendance on prayer meeting and result of same.

At 6:30 p. m. Rev. G. W. Marquardt, of Tamaqua, preached upon the text found in Jer. XII, 23, after which an invitation was extended to those who wished to come to the altar. God wonderfully manifested Himself in these meetings.

The committee having charge of the boarding tent faithfully performed their duty.

On Saturday, at 2:30 p. m., there will be a special service for the society of Christian Endeavor, when Rev. Krause, of Pottsville, who attended the national convention at New York, will make his report.

Bishop Haman, of Reading, will be on the ground on Saturday to remain over Sunday. The Bishop is an able speaker and those who may come to hear him will be well rewarded for their coming.

Investigating supposed Murders.
CATALDO, Idaho, July 22.—Lieut. Smith, who was sent to investigate the supposed murders in the Fourth of July Canyon, has returned and reports that he found a large area that had been burned over. The ashes resembled bone ashes, and some which were in the form of bones crumbled upon being touched. The ashes were brought here for examination by an expert.

CAD KIPLING AGAIN.
He Arrives at Montreal and Makes a Public Display of Rudeness.

MONTREAL, July 22.—Rudyard Kipling used to have a great many admirers in Montreal who intended to pay him honor and homage should he ever visit this city. He arrived at the Windsor Hotel yesterday with his wife, and made himself about as much detested as a man can in one day.

One of his many orders was that he should not be disturbed by anyone under any circumstances, and the many persons who called when they heard of his arrival were so told. One prominent merchant here, a great admirer of his, who also accosted him, was informed by Kipling that he did not wish for any new acquaintances.

The worst treatment was received by the Pen and Pencil Club, to which the principal artists and literary folks of the Dominion belong. They tendered a reception in their beautiful club rooms; but without even going to the trouble to inform them to that effect, he failed to appear and slighted them in a manner which will never be forgotten.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., July 22.—Nearly \$2,000 were realized at a fair given yesterday by Mrs. J. N. Rutter, a New York cottager here, for the benefit of the Children's Fold of New York. The money will be used to purchase a summer home for children somewhere along the Hudson.

The goods sold at the fair were donated by Mrs. Rutter. The gathering at the cottage was a most brilliant one, the elite of the seaside being present and fabulous prices being obtained for the goods.

Work on the Ruins of St. John's.
HALIFAX, July 22.—Gen. Sir John Ross received a cable dispatch from the Imperial authorities yesterday, ordering him to send a company of Royal Engineers to St. John's, N. F. They are required there to blow down walls which are either dangerous or difficult to remove by ordinary means. The number of families burned out is 1,874, making 9,000 people rendered homeless by the great fire.
