**WILL BE ALL RIGHT.**  
**Washington Officials Think Ryder Will be Vindicated.**

**WASHINGTON, July 23.**—The State Department has received no information about the alleged arrest of Consul Ryder at Copenhagen for fraud, and doesn't know whether there is any truth in the story or not.

It is known, however, that Mr. Ryder has been having some trouble over the settlement of an estate, and it is quite likely that he may have been prosecuted. The Department officials are certain that there will be no trouble in establishing an absolute vindication of the Consul.

It appears that Consul Ryder was called upon to settle an estate, including a small bequest of something less than \$100—the testator dying in America.

In the settlement the relatives claim that they did not receive \$35, which was due them. On the other hand, Consul Ryder has receipts and papers from them covering the whole transaction. There has been some correspondence on the subject between the State Department and the Danish Minister, and their investigation effectually cleared the Consul of any wrongdoing. The officials of the Department also point to the fact that Mr. Ryder has given very satisfactory service in the Consular field for more than 20 years, and say that it is not likely now that he would go astray for a paltry sum of \$35.

**WESTERN RATE WAR.**  
Railroads Centering in St. Louis Fighting Each Other.

**St. Louis, July 23.**—The opening gun has been fired in what will probably result in the liveliest rate war that Western railroads have engaged in for some years. The announcement that the Santa Fe and San Francisco lines had made a rate of \$12 from Chicago and St. Louis to Denver and return was quickly followed by similar action on the part of the Missouri Pacific, Chicago & Alton, and Wabash railroads.

Each of these roads has posted the \$12 rate and it is intimated that the war may be "carried into Africa." The action of the Santa Fe line is regarded as uncalled for and is in violation of the Western Traffic Association agreement. This violation nullifies all contracts, and it will not be surprising if competing lines will inaugurate a rate war to the west, south and southwest that will exceed the rate war of former years.

**Cardinal Gibbons' 58th Birthday.**

**BALTIMORE, July 23.**—Cardinal Gibbons yesterday celebrated his 58th birthday. No special observance of the occasion was made at the Arch-episcopal residence owing to the absence of his Eminence, who is summering at Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he is the guest of Archbishop O'Brien. A number of congratulatory telegrams were sent by the clergy and his many friends in Baltimore during the day. Advice from Nova Scotia state that the Cardinal is in good health and thoroughly enjoying his vacation.

**Charged With Murder.**

**OMAHA, July 23.**—Charges of alleged fraud and deception have been brought against Chancellor C. F. Creighton of the Nebraska Wesleyan University. A Crosey, formerly of Lincoln, but later of Utah, alleges a deal on the part of the chancellor in connection with several real estate men at the time the university was planned, whereby Crosey was defrauded out of several thousand dollars. The charge against Chancellor Creighton, that he killed his aunt, has also been revived, and the whole thing will be laid before Presiding Elder Siethe for a thorough investigation.

**A Government Survey Stopped.**
