THE CASE OF IAMS.

It is the Great Topic of Discussion - Feeling in the National Guard. HOMESTEAD, Pa., July 26.-An indirect result of the shooting of Mr. Frick gives Homestead its one existing topic of discussion. It is the case of W. L. Iams, the private of Co. K, Tenth Regiment, who shouted "Hurrah for the man who did it," when told of the act of Berkman, and as a punishment was strung up by his thumbs, had one side of his head and half his moustache shaved and was drummed out of camp. In addition to this disgrace the sentence carries with it dishonorable discharge from the National Guard and denial of the right to enlist in the Federal army and the rights of citizenship.

The Iams case threatens to become national. Homestead people talk of nothing else. Even the return of Hugh O'Donnell after his release from prison was subordinated by it. Letters and telegrams denouncing the treatment of the young man have been received in Homestead, in Pittsburg, and by the Governor of Pennsylvania. One of the protests to Gov. Pattison was from the Washington correspondents of Pennsylvania asking for the removal of Lieut.-Col. Streator, who ordered the punishment to Iams.

When Col. Streator was told of this last night, he said if those correspondents came over to his camp and made any such treasonable remarks as those made by Iams, he would treat them in the same way he had treated Iams. Young Iams threatens to bring suit against Col. Streator and Major-Gen. Snowden, but this is by no means the most serious aspect of the case if reports be true. It has caused much feeling in the National Guard, particularly among the rank and file, and members of the Tenth Regiment are authority for the statement that Co. K, to which Iams belonged, will have to be disbanded, because its men do not intend to re-enlist after their present terms of enlistment have expired.

Several Tenth Regiment men made this statement. They say that Iams was not popular, but they wish to show their disapproval of his punishment by leaving the militia.

Officers of the troops almost generally approve Col. Streator's action. Col. Case, of the Fourth Regiment, told his men that if any of them indulged in any jubilation over Berkman's crime he would treat them the same way. But if Col. Case had treated the expressions of some of his soldiers to a reporter he would have discovered that they do not share his views in approving the humiliating punishment accorded to Private Iams.

They condemned Iams' remark, but thought his punishment brutal and outrageous. Officers of Iams' regiment, the Tenth, were seemingly a unit in upholding Col. Streator. They grew heated in their condemnation of the disgraced private and lauded their commander for his action. If many of the officers think Iams was treated harshly, they failed to say so. A few of them, however, made comments not flattering to Streator's action.

Iams, the disgraced man, came to Homestead yesterday from Pittsburg, where he spent the night. He was looking for Col. Streator. He crossed the river to the camp of the Tenth and was told that Col. Streator had crossed to the other side. Iams came back, but did not find the colonel. He then went back to Pittsburg.

Planning a Big Strike. ST. LOUIS, July 26.-Last night at a meeting of carpenters a number of addresses were made advocating a strike in the near future, if every demand of organized labor in this city is not acceded to. A committee was appointed to order a strike if the boss-builders do not cease using non-union made doors, frames, etc. The situation in the building trade looks serious, as it is not improbable that during the coming week there will be a general strike of carpenters in support of the planning mill employes. With the carpenters and the planning mill employes on a strike the other trades would be obliged to quit work.

Funds to Employ Strikers' Counsel. ST. PAUL, July 26.-A meeting has been called here for the purpose of forming an organization to raise funds to supply the arrested Homestead workmen with counsel when they are put on trial on the charge of murder. Two prominent lawyers, W. H. Erwin, of St. Paul, and George W. Arno, of Sioux City, have declared that they will appear for the defense of the Homestead men if their expenses are paid. It is thought a large fund will be obtained, and that other prominent lawyers will be secured.

Died from Their Injuries. BOSTON, July 26.-William Scott, of East Boston, a fireman on the Grand Junction railroad, who was mangled between moving cars Saturday, is dead, at the City Hospital. Alexander Tatria, aged 35, a brakeman on the Fitchburg railroad, who was run over Saturday night, is dead at the Massachusetts General Hospital. John McCaughlin, aged 28, a seaman, who was knocked down by a Union freight railroad car Saturday night, has died of his injuries.

Killed by an Italian Boy. NEW YORK, July 26.-Last evening an Italian boy named Luppia, first name and residence unknown, was stabbed in the left breast by Nicollini Vincenzo, aged 15 years, in Rocco Tocezza's barber shop, Sixth avenue, where both were employed. Luppia was removed to St. Vincent's Hospital, where he died soon after. The murderer escaped.

The Dalton Gang Show Themselves. ADAIR, I. T., July 26.-The Dalton gang, which recently held up and robbed the Missouri, Kansas & Texas express train, are camped twenty-five miles from here. Members of the gang are in town frequently and do not try to conceal their identity. The robbers are very bold, and it is thought they are planning another raid.

Killed While at Play. NEWARK, N. J., July 26.-Charles Robinson was accidentally killed in the afternoon while fooling with Victor Stahlern, an employe of Wolters & Co., of Mulberry street. Robinson, who suffered from heart disease, was struck in the chest and fell dead. Stahlern gave himself up and was held on the charge of murder.

Fatally Hurt By a Belt. NEWARK, N. J., July 26.-Martin Dallmad, 133 Hamburg place, employed in Heller & Mors' Blue Works, was caught in the belt in the afternoon and his right arm was torn from the socket, two of his ribs were broken, and his body was so badly mangled that he will die.
