BULLET THROUGH HIS HEAD.

And Yet Murderer Eggleston, of Wilkes-Barre, May Live.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., July 29.—Alexander Eggleston, who murdered his wife Wednesday night, shot at his son and then fired a bullet through his head, is still alive. He was pronounced dead and laid beside the body of his wife, but when the coroner reached the house, which had been locked pending his arrival, he found that Eggleston had thrown off the covering placed over him and had crawled to the door.

He was removed to the hospital, where his case was pronounced a remarkable one, as the bullet passed clear through his head.

A silver tube has been run through the furrow and there is a possibility of his living.

Cheer For Eastern Farmers.

Augusta, Me., July 29.—The annual report of B. Walker McKee, secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, for 1891-'92 will be issued shortly. He says that the general outlook for farmers seems to be improving, and not only the tendency toward better times for agricultural products, but the farmers never seemed more hopeful than now. New outlets are everywhere opening for the sale of farm products, and the tide of Western immigration and Western speculation has slackened. More money is being put into circulation in the State than ever before.

The Kite Will Have a Hard Time.

PHILADELPHIA, July 29.—The British steamship Petunia, Capt. Owen, has just arrived here from Pileys Island, Newfoundland, with a cargo of pyrite ore and a perilous voyage having been imprisoned in the ice in the northern regions of the Bay of Notre Dame. From the description given by Capt. Owen of the ice blockade it is predicted that the relief steamer Kite, which has gone to the rescue of Lieut. Peary and party, will have a rough time working her way northward through the ice, and her crew may have to endure many hardships.

Big Oil Tank Fire.

PITTSBURGH, July 29.—Tank No. 17, of the Southwest Pennsylvania Pipe Line Company, six miles from Washington, was struck by lightning during a thunder storm Wednesday night. It contained 27,000 barrels of oil. When it burst the burning fluid spread to other tanks, and soon twenty in all were on fire. The flames are still raging, notwithstanding the efforts of some 300 men who have been fighting the flames since they began.

Colonel King Must Hang.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 29.—H. Clay King, the Memphis murderer, and his attorney pleaded for the petition of habeas corpus before Judge Jackson in the United States Court here yesterday. Sheriff McLando of Shelby county appeared by Attorney-General Pickle for the State. The argument was based on the fact that King went into Arkansas. Judge Jackson denied the petition.

Freezing Does Not Destroy Microbes.

PARIS, July 29.—Dr. Pasteur has written a letter in which he affirms that most of the ice used in this city is infectious. He declares that freezing does not destroy microbes, and that unfrozen water is just as dangerous when it is cool as it was before. He attributes much of the summer illness called cholera to impure drinking water.

Soltau's Bodies Found.

LONG BEACH HOTEL, L. I., July 29.—The body of Ernst Soltau, who was drowned from the naptha launch, both of Long Beach, July 19, was recovered at Pa. Rockaway in the morning. Robert Soltau's body was found on Hicks Beach at noon by Whitney Van Wycklen.
