JUDGE BARTSOH SPEAKS.

Orator of the Day at a Utah Corner Stone Laying.

The HERALD is in receipt of a copy of the Salt Lake Herald, giving an account of very impressive ceremonies attending the laying of the corner stone of the joint city and county building at that place on July 25th, last. The ceremonies were of an imposing character and were conducted by the Grand Master Masons. The orator of the day was Hon. J. W. Bartsoh, Judge of Salt Lake county, who was superintendent of the public schools of this town for several years. In concluding his address Judge Bartsoh said:

"In conclusion and in behalf of Salt Lake county I desire to acknowledge the debt of gratitude which we owe to you, most wonderful grand master, and to your craft who have performed the ceremonies at the laying of this corner stone. You represent that ancient and most honorable order of Free Masons. Your participation adds great dignity and solemnity to these exercises, and as your order is bound together by the most solemn ties of friendship and brotherly love, may not that same spirit be permitted to pervade this entire territory and unite with that same bond of affection a people discordant, belligerent, into a solid phalanx to promote peace and harmony and in their onward march to so develop the treasures which yet lie hidden in our rugged but picturesque mountains and beautiful valleys, that Utah may become a state that will shine forth in all its brilliancy among the foremost of our great producing states."

THE ELECTROCUTION OF WOOD.

Death Was Instantaneous—History of the Crime.

DANMORA, N. Y., Aug. 3.—The first use of the electric chair in Danmora prison yesterday, by which Joseph, better known as "Cal" Wood, paid the penalty of his crime, was in all respects a success. The current was applied at 11:58.

When Wood reached the chair, the keepers stepped to one side, and without hesitation the prisoner said:

"I want to thank Warden Thayer for his great kindness to me. Also my keepers. My time on earth is not long enough to return my thanks to Judge Whitman for his noble efforts. He has been nearer than a brother to me, and I hope he will live a long life and die happy in the Lord."

As he sat down in the chair Wood said in a strange voice: "God remember me." He repeated this three times while the straps were being adjusted. His last words were: "God bless me," repeated twice.

The fatal signal was given by Keeper Welts of Auburn prison.

As the contact came Wood's body straightened out rigidly and his hands turned upward on the arms of the chair.

Twelve seconds was the duration of the first contact. The second contact was two seconds shorter, and, as it reached full power, a curl of blue smoke arose from the murderer's forehead and an odor of burned rubber filled the room.

This was repeated in the third and fourth contact, each of which lasted six seconds.

The condemned man's death was pronounced by the physicians instant and painless.

Jos. Wood, was convicted Sept. 17, 1891, of murdering his father-in-law, Leander Pasco, a farmer of Warren county, on May 10, 1890.

The prisoner pleaded not guilty, alleging temporary insanity.

The successive courts adjudged him guilty, and Gov. Flower refused to interfere.

On March 2, previous to the crime, Wood had secretly married Pasco's daughter. Immediately after the marriage they separated, each going home.

Pasco, who was very severe with his children, was displeased with the marriage and refused to recognize Wood.

About a month later Wood told a neighbor that Pasco, who was then living with his housekeeper, "ought to be put out of the way, so the children could have his property."

After Wood and his wife went to live together they were subjected to some petty annoyance, which they charged to Pasco.

Wood sought to get a warrant for his arrest but, being denied, uttered more threats.

About three weeks later Pasco was murdered by two gun-shot wounds. It was satisfactorily proven that Wood had lain in ambush for him.

FOUR FATALLY BURNED.

An Oil Explosion Creates Havoc Near Springfield, O.

SPRINGFIELD, O., Aug. 3.—The Cincinnati division of the Big Four had a bad wreck of thirteen loaded freight cars at Cold Springs, four miles west of here, during the day.

An hour later the wreck, saturated with naphtha from a leaking tank, caught fire from someone's pipe. Railroaders, quarrymen and spectators from this city to the number of 250 were working and standing around the wreck.

The flames spread to a naphtha tank, from which a tiny stream of oil was spurting.

There was a terrific explosion and the naphtha tank shot into the air.

The burning oil was showered all around, and thirty-five men were burned, four fatally. Those four are:

Tom Haines, quarryman.

John Haines, quarryman.

Ernest Wilson, quarryman.

William Craze, Big Four section hand.

The others badly hurt are: Frank Liebold, M. Evans, F. Dennis, L. Wells, A. Zimmer, and L. W. Liebold, railroaders, and Lemuel Shockey, Jack Tobin, Samuel Collin, William Crane, William Kennedy, James Ford, and William Kurtz, quarrymen.

The Honduras Revolution.

PANAMA, Aug. 3.—The steamship Baracoata brings news concerning the closing scenes in the Honduras revolution. Gen. Leonario Nuila has been completely successful, and ex-President Bogran has been shot, after having been imprisoned for some time in Santa Barbara. Dr. Bonilla is Provisional President, and a new government has been organized.

Slept Sixty Hours.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Minnie Gless, 18 years of age, of this city, has just awakened from a continuous sleep of 60 hours, during which time all attempts to arouse her have been unsuccessful. The doctors pronounce it hysteria. She says that she suffered intensely during her long sleep and remembers everything that transpired while she slept.

A Stay for the Boy Murderer.

TRENTON, N. J., Aug. 3.—Judge Green of the Federal Court yesterday morning denied the application for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Robert Alden Fales, the boy murderer. Judge Green subsequently granted a stay of proceedings and the death watch was removed.

Dr. McGeogal & Co. Free.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Dr. Henry G. McGeogal, Dr. Marion A. Dale and Frank Webb were declared by coroner's jury in Long Island City last evening to be innocent of the murder of Mrs. Louise Webb. The prisoners were set at liberty.

Duke of Manchester Improving.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The Duke of Manchester surprised his physicians by evidence of vitality, when it was supposed that his death was a matter of a few hours. He slept last night and took food this morning.

Shot While Forcing an Entrance.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Ralph Allen of 725 Jefferson street shot and killed William Sweeney, aged 20 years, of 41 West Seneca street, shortly before daylight as the latter was trying to force an entrance into his house.

Democrats Win in Portsmouth, N. H.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 3.—The Democrats yesterday re-elected Mayor John J. Laskey by 798 majority over Brewster, the Republican nominee, and also elected their entire city ticket.
