ENGLAND never seems satisfied with sureness of her control of the Mediterranesn. MR. HARRISON ASKS IT

Congress Requested to Close Up Business.

HIS WIFE'S ILLNESS THE REASON.

An Adjournment To-Night or To-Morrov Probable-A Vore on the World's Fair Bill Is Expected To-Day - Sundry Civil Appropriations Again Extended.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 .- In deference to the urgent request of President Harrison, Congress will adjourn either late to-night or early to-morrow morning. The Presilent made known his desire for an imme diate adjournment to Speaker Crisp in an interview at the White House yesterday, basing the request upon the condition o Mrs. Harrison's health, which makes it necessary for her husband to join her

It is unusual for the President to make any suggestions concerning an adjournment to the leaders of the House, especially when that body is of the opposite political faith to his own, but in this case there has been no thought of precedent.

For a week past the President has comnunicated daily with Speaker Crisp, 18 quiring anxiously concerning the pros pects of adjournment. In his interview with the Speaker the President offered to spend Friday night at the Capitol if necessary in order that bus-iness might be despatched and an early adjournment effected.

The President has also appealed to the

Senate, and it is believed to be owing to his earnest request that the intimation has been given that the Durborrow bill will encounter no opposition when it reaches the Upper House. In discussing the situation Speaker Crisp said this morning.

"I do not see why we cannot get away late to night. The Durborrow bill will be passed and sent to the Senate before 2 o'clock, and the conference report on the Sundry Civil bill will not occupy us more than an hour or two.

THE STRUGGLE IN THE HOUSE. Believed That it is Practically Over-Decisive Vote Probable To-Day.

Washington, Aug. 5,-The storn clouds which have hovered over the House for nearly two weeks have lifted and there is smallght ahead. Unless something unforseen happens, there is every reason to believe that the fight over the World's Fair item has ended, the Sundry Civil will pass, also a separate making an appropriation (as a gift) of \$2,500,000 for the Fair, and that Congress

will adjourn in a few days.

When the House assembled Mr. Catchings, (Dem., Miss.,) from the committee on rules reported a resolution making the day suspension day, which was adopted. Mr. Biolman then submitted a resolu-

tion extending the appropriations under the Sundry Civil bill until August 10, which was agreed to.

Mr. Holman offered a resolution that the House should reconsider the vote by which it decided to recede from its dis-agreement to the Senate amendments in the Sundry Civil bill; insist upon a further disagreement and send it to conference again. He moved its passage.

This proposition was debated by Mr. Bingham (lep., Pa.) who said that personally he had no information about the action of the Advisory Committee, except that obtained from the public press. There was an agreement on the Republi-can side of the House that the appropria-tions should be extended for six days. All preliminary proceedings had been con-curred in by the Republicans in order that the Sundry Civil bill should go to conference. He thought the House was entitled

the plan proposed.

Mr. Reilly (Dem., Pa.) read the proposi-tion and said that in the interest of public business the Advisory Committee had business the Advisory Committee had submitted the agreement as the best solution possible moder the circumstances He hoped there would be no obstruction to the proposition, and said that if there was he had no doubt that the necessary cloture rule could be obtained from the Committee on Rules to compel a vote. There had not been a dissenting voice in the caucus of 120 Democratic members.

Mr. McMillin (Dem., Tenn.) said that the terms of the agreement were well un-derstood, and that no one had a right to speak for the Committee on Rules.

Mr. Dingley (Rep., Mc.) then desired to know how a vote was to be had, and Mr. Dockery (Dem., Mo.), sotto voce, said they could cross that bridge when they came

Mr. Henderson (Rep., Ill.) could see nothing ahead but a trap. It reminded him of the spider and the fly.

Mr. Reilly (Dem. Pa.) then offered a reso-lution and asked its passage, that the House should consider the substitute for the Durborrow bill appropriating \$2,5000,000 at once and to vote upon it to-day at one o'clock, no intervening motion to be entertuned until the bill shall have been finally disposed of, After heated debate the resolution passed by a vote of 157 to 7.
