WILL ADMIT IT FREE.  
Directions to Collector Hendricks About the Columbus Statue.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Acting Secretary Spaulding of the Treasury Department has addressed a letter to the Collector of Customs at New York informing him that he is advised by the Secretary of State that the statue of Columbus will reach the port of New York at the end of this month on the Italian naval transport Garigliano, and requests that the statue be admitted free of duty and that all proper courtesy may be shown to the vessel, her crew and officers.

Mr. Spaulding instructs the Collector to carry out these requests.

Paris Green on Potatoes.

BANGOR, Me., Aug. 16.—A family named Morgan, living in Hampden, were poisoned on Saturday by eating potatoes on which Paris green had been used to kill bugs. The father and son are now somewhat relieved, but the mother may not recover. Other persons in the neighborhood who used some of the potatoes were also taken sick, but less violently than were the Morgans.

Challenged for a Balloon Contest.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 16.—Miss E. C. Crawford, of this city, has challenged Miss Rosa May of Peoria, Ill., the aeronaut and parachute leaper, to a test of skill, \$300 a side and balloon against balloon. The points on which the contest are to be decided are: Time consumed in filling balloon, height of ascension, height of jump in parachute, and length of time of balloon in air.

The United States steamship Boston has been ordered to proceed to Honolulu to relieve the United States steamer San Francisco.

Five sailors have made complaint at Victoria, B. C., that they were kidnapped by the Sailors' Union at Port Gable and shipped to Victoria.

The property of C. H. Abbott & Co., owners of shoe factories in Chelsea and South Royalton, Vt., has been attached. Liabilities unknown.

A conference was held at the Treasury Department yesterday afternoon with a view to shutting out all woolen goods from Europe likely to be infected with cholera.

Signs of phylloxera have appeared among the vines at Rilly, near Rheims, and at Ay and Hautvillers, France. All infected vines are being destroyed without delay.

William Martin, who claims to be the champion six-day bicycle rider of the world, has issued a challenge to Charles W. Ashinger to ride a 24-hour race for \$200 a side.

The body of a boy named Raymond, of Hull, Quebec, was found in the mountains near Lake Tappen, this State yesterday, half eaten by a bear and evidences of a terrible encounter all around.

Since the 3rd of August \$1,200,000 in small notes have been sent from the Sub-Treasury in New York to the Western States to meet the demand for notes of small denominations, growing out of the movement of crops.

The "Pall Mall Gazette" of London comes out with a repetition of the rumor that Mary Anderson will soon return to the stage. Mary Anderson and her husband have of late been residing at Oban, Argyshire, Scotland.

Acting Secretary Ades of the State Department has received word from Minister Egan at Valparaiso saying that the Chilean Senate and Chamber of Deputies have unanimously passed the appropriation for the payment of claims growing out of the Baltimore riot.

Leighton Brothers, Portsmouth, N. H., have given a \$550,000 option until Oct. 1 for the purchase of the Isles of Shoals to a syndicate which contemplates building a big pier and a mammoth hotel on Smuttys Neck Island and the keeping of Star and Appledore Islands as exclusive resorts. The scheme involves about \$1,000,000.

Col. H. C. Nutt, who died at Boston yesterday, was born in Vermont and began life as a train newsboy. He advanced to be chief engineer of the Florida & Georgia Railroad. He was a contractor for the transfer of freight over the Missouri River. He engaged in the elevator business in Chicago, and later accepted the presidency of the Atlantic & Pacific road.

Well-Poisoner Evans Arrested.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 16.—William Evans, who is suspected of the wholesale poisoning of the Hosser family and others at Oakgrove, near Laurel, Del., by putting arsenic in the well, was arrested in the afternoon while unloading railroad ties at Tacony, a suburb of this city. The arrest was made at the request and in the presence of Delaware State detectives Bernard J. McVey and Walter Vitell. Evans will be held to await such action as may follow disclosures by further investigation of the affair.
