THE COURT CALENDAR.

Harry Hall Gets Off With a Very Light Sentence.

Harry T. Hall, the man who attempted to destroy his photograph gallery in town by arson, has escaped the consequences of his crime with a remarkably light sentence. He was called up for sentence yesterday. He was fined \$50 and sentenced to nineteen months imprisonment from the time of his commitment, which will leave the actual sentence of imprisonment at fifteen months.

McHale is charged with stabbing Richard Gaughan in a general fight that took place on North Jardin street on August 13th, last.

Fossil Flowers in Maine.

Rev. M. R. Keep, who, according to the Daily Eastern Argus, is one of the best informed local geologists in Aroostook county, says that a rare fossil is found in the limestone of that county. "The most wonderful deposit of fossils," he says, "in the world, perhaps, is found at Square lake, near Fort Kent, of the old Silurian age; geologists from different countries finding forty or fifty different species of trilobites, the most abundant, however, is the encrinurus, or water lily of that primal age. Large masses of rock are made up of the stems of these lilies. The bloom and buds of these lilies are seldom found, but a full blooming head of the encrinurus was lately found at Square lake by James Bolton, of Presque Isle. This is the first I have ever heard of being found in this region. The stone fossil is like a medium-sized blooming rose."
