In 1861 Col. Fowler, in company with his cousin, N. D. Fowler, and two others, visited Washington. In ordering dinner the Colonel called for chicken. After waiting some time he heard a commotion in the back yard. Upon making inquiries as to the cause he learned that the chicken had objected to being killed and cooked and that if he desired to dine on "chick" he would have to wait until a sheriff's posse could get the fowl within the dead line. The Colonel countermanded the

At the inauguration of Lincoln on March 4th, 1861, the spokesman of the New York Republican delegation acked Andrew Johnson, the newly elected Vice President. his opinion of James Buchanan. He replied that "he never spent ammunition on dead ducks." Col. Fowler heard this conversation and is worth recording since it has been asserted, and is believed to this day by many, that this remark was intended for the late Hon, John W. Forney.

Before the war Col. Fowler was captain of one of the best cavalry companies in the state, connected with the militia. It comprised some of the leading citizens of Tamaqua. Col. Fowler tendered the services of the company to Simon Cameron, but the offer was declined, on the ground that it would take too long to drill the horses and otherwise prepare the company for active service. Tamaqua bad three infantry companies, the German Light Infantry, Captain Beck; Scott Rifler, Captain Lebo, and Jackson Guards, Captain Higgins, and the services of all were accepted. They served three months.

A story is told of the German Light Infantry. During a parade on battalion day the company appeared in white breeches The manoeuvres took place on Dutch Hill. There was always plenty of beer on tap on such days. On one occasion some one put croton oil in the beer and the result was most disastrous.
