THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC.

Notes from One of Our Thriving Catholic Neighbors. The list of the principal cities of the Argentine Republic, given by Don Juan S. Attwell in the New England Magazine, shows that things are booming in South America as well as in North. It is as follows: The capital, Buenos Aires; La Plata, capital of the province of Buenos Aires; Chivilcoy, Dolores and Bahia Blanca, in the province of Buenos Aires; Rosario, in the province of Santa Fe; Cordoba, Corrientes, Entre Rios, Santa Fe, San Juan, San Luis, Mendoza, Catamarca, Tucuman, La Rioja, Santiago del Estero, Salta and Jujui, all capitals of provinces of the same name. The principal seaports are Buenos Aires, Rosario, La Plata and Bahia Blanca. Rosario is in the province of Santa Fe, situated on the banks of the Parana river, and many of the products of the northern provinces are exported by way of Rosario, which is a city of some 80,000 inhabitants. Bahia Blanca is situated in the southwesternmost part of the province of Buenos Aires, being a city of some 30,000 inhabitants. The foundation of La Plata was laid in 1880, and now it has one of the best cities in South America, built on the same plan as Washington, D. C. Its public buildings are monumental, its harbor one of the finest in the world, and its population has grown during the last decade from nothing to 50,000.

DID THE PELICAN COUNT?

Or Was It Simply a Case of Animal Observation. Honza de la Hada, says the St. Louis Republic, tells of a pelican living in a fisherman's family at Santo Domingo that fed upon the refuse of the fish-cleaning. Every week day it would go to the shore looking for the food which the boats were sure to bring in. Now, the owner of this pet pelican, although a rough fisherman, was of a pious turn of mind and always observed Sabbath. The pelican was not long in learning this and the fact that he was unwillingly made to observe a forced fast every seventh day. Within a short time he had such a clear idea of the regular return of the day that he would sit motionless all day on Sunday on a tree near the house without once attempting to go to the beach for his daily allowance of refuse fish-trimmings. Mme. Royer, in commenting on this remarkable exhibition of reasoning faculties in a bird says: "It is not necessary to suppose that the pelican has learned to count the six days, at the end of which time its masters would not go fishing, but while it really estimated daily the time when it must make its excursions to the beach, it was informed of the return of Sunday by what was going on at the house, as, for instance, the fishermen putting on their Sunday clothes. In the same way the dog knows when his master is ready to start on a hunt by seeing him with gun and game bag."

CATHOLICS AT NEWARK.

German Representatives From Many States in Convention. NEWARK, N. J., Sep. 27.—The German Catholic societies in convention here are now down to actual business. At a meeting yesterday afternoon resolutions were offered which will be formally acted upon on Wednesday. Several thousand visiting delegates are in town, representing both clergy and laity of the German Catholic Church of a dozen States.

Four thousand people, representing 50 States, took part in the parade last night. The main thoroughfare was brilliantly illuminated, and many of the stores were decorated. The parade passed through the principal streets. The three grand marshals were John B. Oatkers, Jacob Kaiser and George Brueckner. There were 70 mounted aids and 85 bands of music. The different societies carried different colored lights and formed one of the finest pageants the city has ever seen.

The procession was disbanded at Caledonia Park, where the opening exercises of the four days' session were held. The big hall was packed to the doors when the evening session was begun. Bishop Wigger, of the diocese of Newark, presided. After a brief speech of welcome in German, he introduced James F. Connelly, Controller of the City of Newark, who, in the absence of the Mayor, welcomed the delegates to the city.

He was followed by State Senator Michael G. Barrett, who said that he had been requested by Gov. Abbott to say that business prevented him from being present, but that he would be with the Congress to-day. This was greeted with loud and prolonged cheering.

BOOKMAKER WEBSTER CONVICTED

This Time the Jury Finds Him Guilty of Manslaughter, First Degree.

NEW YORK, Sep. 27.—The second trial of Burton C. Webster, on the charge that he shot Broker Charles E. Goodwin to death at the Percival Plaza, Aug. 2, 1891, ended yesterday afternoon, and the jury came into court at 11:30 last night with a verdict of manslaughter in the first degree. The jury at the former trial disagreed.

A much stronger case has been made against Webster in this trial by the District Attorney, who was confident that a verdict of guilty would be found.

Webster's defense was on the same line as that produced on the former trial. This was that he went to Goodwin's apartments to resent an alleged insult to his (Webster's) "common law" wife, an actress known as Evelyn Granville, and that, in defending himself from assault at the hands of Goodwin, he was forced to use his pistol with fatal effect.

SAYS HE IS THE MURDERER.

William Lewis Accuses Himself of Killing Rose Ambler.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Sep. 27.—William Lewis of Stratford got into a barroom fight in this city on Saturday night and was struck over the head. A few hours later he was found unconscious on the road home and was taken to the hospital. There the physicians learned that his skull was fractured. His condition is precarious. He was delirious yesterday, and his ravings have caused a sensation.

When the country was excited over the Rose Ambler murder mystery in Stratford, in 1885, Lewis was suspected. The evidence seemed to be strong, but the coroner's jury refused to hold him. While stoutly maintaining his innocence he told contradictory stories, and for a time his case looked black. He had at one time been in love with the girl, but she had married another man.

In his ravings now he talks about Rose and cries out that he murdered her. The man's condition is somewhat improved, there is small chance of his recovery.

NAVAL ESTIMATES.

The Annual Figures for 1894 Ready for Secretary Tracy.

WASHINGTON, Sep. 27.—The annual estimates for the navy for the fiscal year 1894 have been made up and will be sent to the Secretary for transmission to Congress.

It is understood that about \$10,000,000 has been recommended for payments on account of the new navy which will come due between July 1, 1893, and June 30, 1894.

GALE IN MICHIGAN.

Great Damage to Farm Property and Injury to Life.

TUCUMAC, Mich., Sep. 27.—A fierce gale of wind from the northwest, accompanied by rain, swept over this section of the State Sunday night, doing great damage to farm property and causing injury to life.

A summer cottage at Devil's Lake, near here, was blown from its foundations and completely wrecked.

Dashed Into a Train.

NOTHING FROM SCRUGGS.

The State Department Doesn't Believe the Venezuelan Story. WASHINGTON, Sep. 27.—The State Department is not cognizant of any additional trouble between the United States authorities in Venezuela and the recognized Government of that country.

Secretary Foster said to-day that he had heard nothing from Minister Scruggs bearing on the report circulated in New York by the Venezuelan revolutionists there that the steamship Caracas, flying the United States flag, had been boarded at La Guayra by Pillo's soldiers and insults offered, followed by a refusal to apologize.

Secretary Foster said he had received a despatch from Mr. Scruggs on Saturday last, and that there was nothing in the message to indicate that the Minister was practically a prisoner, as stated by the revolutionists in New York, or that the relations between this Government and Venezuela were strained.

It is reported that Archbishops Corrigan and Ireland are to be made cardinals at the coming Papal Consistory.

Mrs. Gussie V. Darling, of Danbury, Conn., was killed last night by being thrown from an electric car in Washington, D. C.

Dr. Leonard, United States Consular Agent at Toronto, Ont., has been offered the position of United States Consul at Stockholm, Sweden.

The fall wool market has opened at San Angelo, Tex. Seventy five thousand pounds have been sold at prices ranging from 14 to 16 cents.

The Industrial Council of Kansas City, Mo., has declared a boycott against four theatres in the city under the control of Melville Hudson.

Edward Van Vranken, colored, was shot in Saratoga, N. Y., by an officer from who was trying to escape. He will probably recover.

Two men were killed and several hurt by falling walls in Long Island City yesterday during the heavy gale which prevailed there.

Elliot Congregational Church, Roxbury, Mass., Sunday celebrated the 60th anniversary of the ordination as its pastor of Rev. Augustus Charles Thompson, D. D.

Prof. E. E. Bernard, the astronomer, who recently discovered the fifth satellite of Jupiter, says it was impossible for Lawyer Cagley of Washington, to have made the discovery as he claims.

The sheriff's posse in pursuit of the Rostyn Bank robbers came upon four of them in a dense forest in Leamway Basin, Wash. One of the desperados was wounded and the others escaped in the darkness.

The three-masted schooner John Burt, laden with 23,000 bushels of corn, bound for Oswego, was wrecked yesterday near the mouth of Big Sandy Creek, on Lake Ontario. One of the crew and the female cook were drowned.

A letter from Mexico City to a New Orleans paper claims that the Garza revolution was engineered by the Diaz government to depreciate the Mexican bonds floated in Germany so that a Mexican syndicate might make several millions in the deal.
