### OUR GAIN.

Those who have ridden across the great Western plains, when the buffslo used to roam by hundreds of thousands, but where nothing but their bleaching bones are now seen, are apt to indulge now only in regrets because of the extermination of these great herds of bison. We used to feel that way ourselves; but recently have been led to take another view of the subject, and again quote in confirmation of our change of views the old saw, that there is no such thing as an uumitigated evil. It did seem cruel and wanton waste to destroy all the buffaloes, but a recent writer has put the matter in such shape that we cannot do better than give his views on the subject. A sentimentalist writes this of the buffalo:

"Of the millions of buffalo which even in our times ranged the plains in freedom, none now remain. From the prairies which they used to darken, the wild herds, down to the last struggling bull, have dissuppeared." The last Sunday by Billups. ess reply is; "Well, where is the loss, except to the sportsman, who is only sorry there is no buffalo left for him to kill? Where the millions of buffalo once roamed there are now millions of cattle. The grass land that a buffalo once required for his sustenance now supports a sleer, and a steer is much more the nobler and useful animal of the two. You can't have wild animals and tame ones, too, on the same territory, and it is certainly better that the great, tough, hulking brutes have gone from our Western plains and the peaceful cattle have taken their places.

MURDER will out. It is rarely the case that a system of thievery, whether of individuals, of corporations, or of Uncle Sam's, fails of detection after a time. The six mall robbers who were arrested this week in Philadelphia have been carrying on their dishonest practice for a long time, but they at length found the length of their tether, and they are now in prison, awaiting the punishment that is certain to follow. Once upon a time the offense of which they are guiltyrobbing the United States mail-was punishable with death.

Washington, Sep. 30,-A San Francisco dispatch rays that the Russian scaler Kotick has arrived from Petropaulov sky with 33,000 skins for the Russian American Sealskin Company, Among the passengers was N. A. Grebinbtzky, Governor of Copper, Behring and Rebbin Islands. He is on his way to St. Peters burg to report on depredations of British senlers.


