### Fire Alarm Boxes.

The following list shows the location of the alarm boxes of the Shenandoah Fire Department:

#### LOCATION.

- 16—Coal and Bowers streets.
- 16—Bowers and Centre streets.
- 24—Bridge and Centre streets.
- 25—Main and Centre streets.
- 34—Main and Poplar streets.
- 35—Main and Coal streets.
- 42—Gilbert and Centre streets.
- 42—Gilbert and Cherry streets.
- 42—Chestnut and Coal streets.

To send an alarm upon the box, pull down the book once and let go. When an alarm is sent in the fire bell will sound the number of the box and repeat the alarm four times.

How to LOCATE ALARMS.  
If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike one, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.

### LITTLE LOCALS

The two designs, one for the domestic and the other for the International Postal Union service have been approved by Postmaster General Wm. McKim and the work of printing and distributing cards will be pushed with all possible speed.

### ANOTHER FALL RIVER MURDER.

John Kennedy Stabbed to Death by His Brother-in-Law.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Oct. 3.—John Kennedy of this city was murdered in Anawan street yesterday afternoon by his brother-in-law, Maurice Kennelly, who lives with him. Both men had been drinking. Shortly before the killing they talked together in the kitchen when some sharp words passed between them, and Kennedy ordered his brother-in-law to pack his trunk and leave the house at once.

Kennelly went into the street, then threw a half pint bottle through a pane of glass into the room where Kennedy was sitting. The latter ran to the door and Kennelly dared him to come out, threatening to run a knife into him. Kennedy went up to him in the middle of the street, whereupon Kennelly struck him. The men clinched, and Kennelly got Kennedy's head under his arm, drew his pocket knife, and plunged it to the hilt into Kennedy's abdomen just below the stomach. The wounded man died in a few minutes. Kennelly was soon captured. Both men were hard drinkers. At the police station Kennelly admitted having committed the crime, and says he did it in self-defense.
