STOP THIEF.

It has been evident for the past week from the hue and cry the Democratic newspapers have been raising about Mr. David Martin, Mr. Quay and Mr. John I. Davenport, that the Democratic lead on hand some particularly outrageous scheme from which they wished to distract public attention. It is an old dodge, well known among pickpockets, after a successful haul, to cry "stop thief!" and set up a chase after some other man, so that they may get off with their plunder.

This probability that the Democrats were up to some nefarious scheme is confirmed by facts. It has been found that hundreds of voters from the contested Democratic districts down town have "moved" lately to much better quarters in some of the up-town districts where extra votes are needed for Democratic nominees for Assembly. This colonization is being carried out on a scale which indicates that it is costing its backers a very large amount of money.

This movement, however, is perhaps not so important as one that is impudently announced in the World. It seems that copies are being made, in office of the Secretary of State, and presumably by state employees, of the census lists deposited in that office, and that these copies are to be furnished to Democratic committees in various parts of the state. The alleged object of this is to prevent fraud; the real object is evidently to perpetrate fraud. The census of 1892 was taken by partisan enumerators for a partisan purpose. Charges were freely made and never disproved, that in this city especially the returns were outrageously padded. The returns have been kept secret by the Secretary of State and nobody has verified them. Now these returns are to be furnished at the expense of the whole state to the Democratic committees and to them

only. Can any one doubt that the Democratic machine will see to it that a vote is cast on every name on the census? With these padded censuses and with a partisan election board in every precinct the Democrats have made preparation for carrying on something very like the Alabama style of counting and casting votes. Forwarded is furnished. Let Republicans be on their guard. No such shameless and outrageous Democratic scheme can be allowed to succeed.—N. Y. Press

During the temporary absence of his wife yesterday, Adolph Burger, 41 years old, an invalid, committed suicide at his home in Brooklyn, N. Y., by cutting his throat.

Rev. Samuel Longfellow, brother of the late poet, Henry W. Longfellow, died at Portland, Me., yesterday, aged 73 years. He had been in feeble health for some time.

The University of Pennsylvania began its 143rd annual session yesterday with 2,000 students in attendance. The freshman class is the largest in the history of the institution, numbering over 700 men.

DEFAULTER DANN'S END

Belief General That He Committed Suicide. DOCTORS TALK OF APOPLEXY. They Think the Post-Mortem Will Justify Their Opinion—Story of the Embarrassment of Half a Million Dollars—The Case in Court Yesterday.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 4.—The death of the notorious defaulter Edward S. Dann last evening, has created a sensation here, and the generally accepted theory as to the nature of the mysterious illness is that he committed suicide, taking a heavy dose of morphine or some other poison. The physicians who attended him declare, on the contrary, their belief that he suffered a stroke of apoplexy, and confidently predict that the post-mortem examination will confirm their theory.

Dann died at 7 o'clock. He was profoundly unconscious at the time of his death, having been in that condition for 48 hours, the attack occurring on Saturday evening at 6 o'clock.

Edward S. Dann stood high in church and social circles. When the bank examiners found that there was a shortage in the accounts of the bank and recommended the arrest of the treasurer, secretary and treasurer, the trustees could not believe that the examiners were right in their conclusions. They had trusted him implicitly for over 20 years—ever since the bank was started.

He had been looked upon as a model of faithfulness, industry and integrity. He was always first to arrive at the bank and last to leave; he was the custodian of church funds, and widows and timid women came to his bank because they had so often seen his silvered head bowed in prayer at the altar. He never took a vacation, and always balanced the books himself. Such an attentive officer the trustees thought could do no wrong.

The examiners hinted that perhaps Dann had reason for working personally over the books and wearing the cloak of sanctity. But the trustees scoffed at the idea. However, private detectives were called in and Dann was put under arrest. He was cool when confronted with accusations, and said he could explain all if time and access to the books were given him. The examiners said they could figure the books without him.

The news of his arrest caused great excitement when it was made known in June. He was not looked up like a common criminal at first, but was allowed to go to and from his house under surveillance of a detective. Then it was that Dann made his first and unsuccessful attempt to take his own life. He swallowed 20 morphine pills. His stomach rebelled, threw off the poison, and he lived on in disgrace.

The examiners found in column after column of figures abstractions running back for a long period of years, and continuing up to the day he was apprehended, when he stole a package of \$10,000 deposited by ex-Justice Charles Daniels of the Supreme Court. The shortage at first was stated at \$100,000, then at \$200,000; then it was said to more than reach the bank's assets.

The trial of Dann, ex-Secretary and Treasurer of the National Savings Bank, on 16 indictments for felony, was to have begun yesterday or to have been avoided by a plea of guilty.

At 10:15 District Attorney Quinby said: "I desire to prove the case of the people against Mr. Dann."

"If the court please" said Mr. Hoyt, Dann's counsel, "I shall be obliged to ask that the case go over for a week. I have here the certificates of two reputable physicians to the effect that Mr. Dann is ill and unable to leave his bed."

He then submitted the certificate of Drs. Harrington and Hopkins to the effect that his client is in a critical condition.

No objection was made by the District Attorney and Judge Titus postponed the case for one week.

The cases of Dann's accomplices, Armstrong and McCredie, were then called.

"I next desire to move the case of the People against Armstrong," said Mr. Quinby.

Attorney Kisselburg, for Armstrong, objected to this on the ground that the presence as a witness of Mr. Dann might be an imperative necessity for his client's defense, and for that reason desired the case similarly put over until Mr. Dann's recovery.

The request was granted.

The case of McCredie was next moved, and his attorney, Tracy C. Becker, also made application for adjournment, presenting certificates from physicians that McCredie is suffering from chronic alcoholism, which has impaired his mental faculties so as to prevent his being able to make defense in a legal proceeding.

Counsel desired a postponement for an indefinite period until McCredie could improve and asked that the case be put over his term.

The District Attorney objected and Judge Titus postponed the case for one week.
