DEFAULTER DANN'S END

Belief General That He Committed Suicide.

DOCTORS TALK OF APOPLEXY

They Think the Post-Mortem Will Justify Their Opinion-Story of the Emb-galement of Half a Million Dollars-The Case in Court Yesterday.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 4 .- The death of the notorious defaulter Edward S. Dann last evening, has created a sensation here, and the generally accepted theory as to the nature of the mysterious illness is that he committed suicide, taking a heavy dose of morphine or some other ison. The physiclaus who attended him declare, on the contrary, their belief that he suffered a stroke of apoplexy, and confidently predict that the ost-mortem examination will confirm their theory.

Dann died at 7 o'clock. He was pre loundly unconscious at the time of hi death, having been in that condition for 49 hours, the attack occurring on Saturday evening at 6 o'clock.

day evening at 6 o'clock. Edward S. Dana stood high in church and social circles. When the bank ex-aminers found that there was a shortage in the accounts of the bank and recommended the arrest of the trusted secretary and treasurer, the trustees could not believe that the examiners were right in their conclusions. They had trusted him implicitly for over 20 years-ever since the bank was started.

He had been looked upon as a model of faithfulnese, industry and integrity. He was always first to arrive at the bank and last to leave; he was the custodian of church funds, and widows and timid women came to his bank because they had so often seen his silvered head bowed in prayer at the altar. He never took a vacation, and always balanced the books himself. Such an attentive officer the

Dann had reason for working personally over the books and wearing the cloak of sanctity. But the trustees scoled at the idea. However, private detectives were called in and Dann was put under arrest. He was cool when confronted with accu-sations, and said he could explain all if time and access to the books were given him. The examiners said they could fig-ure the books without him.

The news of his arrest caused great er-eitement when it was made known in June. He was not locked up like a common criminal at first, but was allowed to go to and from his house under surveillance of a detective. Then it was that Dann made his first and unsuccessful at-tempt to take his own life. He swallowed 30 morphine pills. His stomach rebeiled, threw off the poison, and he lived on in


