THE MAFIA IN CHICAGO.

Believed That Martino Was One of the Society's Victims.

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—Lieut. Wheeler of the Chicago police, who has been working diligently for several days on the case of Eliger Martino, the Italian who was killed Sunday night in a west side saloon, believes that Martino was a victim of the dreaded Mafia, and says that he has good reason to think that a branch of the society which caused so much trouble in New Orleans a little over a year ago exists in this city.

This belief is based upon the actions of the seven Italians who were arrested after the shooting and the positive testimony of three Italians that a branch of the society is established here. The seven men were present in the saloon when the shooting occurred, yet each swore that he did not know who fired the fatal shot.

Later it was gathered from them that they feared the consequences if they told anything. The wife of the murdered man told Lieut. Wheeler that her husband was the victim of the Mafia. A well-to-do Italian barber also notified him of the existence of the society, and an Italian grocer swore that he knew of its existence here.

PANIC ON A STEAMER.

People Jump Overboard from a Boat on a Lake of Rocks.

CATSKILL, Oct. 6.—Two Poughkeepsie fire organizations took part in the tri-county firemen's parade yesterday, reaching here by excursion on the steamer Emeline. As the boat was going out of the creek on the return trip, shortly after 8 o'clock last evening, she ran on a ledge of rocks in comparatively shallow water, and now lies in a wrecked condition, one wheel badly stove in and the hull in undoubtedly bad shape.

There were over 400 people on board, many of them women; but it is believed that all got safely ashore, although many passengers became panic-stricken, jumped overboard and swam to land.

Corbett Welcomed at Asbury Park.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Oct. 6.—Champion Jim Corbett returned to his old training quarters yesterday for the first time since his departure for his fight with Sullivan. The many friends he made while in training were all at the station to meet him, and were also at the Opera House at night to see him in his new play "Gentleman Jim." Before going on the stage he told the reporters that he would not pay any attention to Billy Madden's efforts to bring about a match between himself and Goddard.

The Fight Was a Draw.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 6.—The often postponed fight between T. R. Brown, of Hartford, and "Billy" Russell of this city, for the featherweight championship of the State and a purse of \$500, came off in a hall on the outskirts of the city last night. The spectators were mostly Yale students and gave \$5 a piece for tickets.

Mitchell's Majority at Least 27,000.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 6.—Mitchell (Democrat) is elected Governor by fully 27,000 majority. Only one county (Baker) gave a majority in electing him. The Legislature will be solidly Democratic in both branches.
