BLOODY BATTLE AT LOS TEQUES

Six Hundred Killed -- Officers Made Prison ers.-The Victorious General Intends En tering Caracas Immediately-La Gonyr still in the Government's Possession. LA GUATRA, Venezuela, Oct. 6. - A

desperate battle has just taken place at Los Teques, a small town on the railroad line to Valencia, at a distance about equal between that place and Caracas.

Six hundred are killed and many high government officials captured. Cresp has struck another decisive blow, which following upon his previous successe since the revolution began in last March means victory for the Crespistas.

To-day, Caracas is more than ever ex cited. Crespo has announced his determination to enter the capital immediately

NEW YORK, Oct. 6 .- The steamship Venezusia, just arrived from La Guayra brings the latest news from the Venezuelan revolution. As affairs stand now the long struggle is nearing an end and will result in the overthrow of the govern ment, which has made such a persistent fight.

According to the reports, Gen. Colino with a force of 6,000 men, joined Gen. Crespo, the revolutionist leader, at Valencin, on Sunday, Sept. 25. This, the report says, made Crespo's force number 16,000 men. On Monday, Sept. 25, Gen. Crespo started his forces for Caracas. portion of his advance guard arrived at


La Victoria on Sept. 28. Crespo is advancing his forces upon Caracas by different routes. They all expect to meet at Caracas:

The march from Valencia would occupy from 12 to 15 days, provided there is no interruption. At Les Peques the revo-lutionists will fight their decisive battle. Las Peques is the best fortified place that the government holds, and Gen. Polido is there with 6,000 soldiers.
