Fire Alarm Boxes.

The following list shows the location of the alarm boxes of the Shenandoah Fire Department:

LOCATION.

- 15—Coal and Hovers streets.
- 16—Hovers and Centre streets.
- 24—Bridge and Centre streets.
- 25—Main and Centre streets.
- 31—Main and Poplar streets.
- 34—Main and Coal streets.
- 42—Gilbert and Centre streets.
- 43—Gilbert and Cherry streets.
- 50—Chester and Coal streets.

To send an alarm open the box, pull down the hook once and let go. When an alarm is sent in the fire bell will sound the number of the box and repeat the alarm four times.

HOW TO LOCATE ALARMS.

If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike one, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

- The Democrats of the 17th New York Congressional District renominated Henry Baker of Orange county.
- B. B. Jones of Haverhill, Mass., has been appointed receiver of the Order of the Helping Hand, a five-year endowment concern.
- Harry Kernell, the well-known Irish comedian, has been pronounced insane, and removed to Bloomingdale Asylum, New York.
- Jacob Lefever, of New Paltz, Ulster county, New York, was nominated by the Republicans of the 18th district for Member of Congress.
- The notorious Sharon case was yesterday settled by Judge Bank, of San Francisco, who declared Sarah Althea, the widow of William Sharon.
- Rev. Beverly E. Warner, of Bridgeport, Conn., has received a call to Trinity Episcopal Church, of New Orleans, one of the largest and richest churches in the South.
- Charles Harris, a member of the A. M. Palmer Company, now playing at the Columbia, in Chicago, is dying of Bright's disease in St. Luke's Hospital in that city.
- The bodies of three more of the men entombed in the Norris Mine at Ironwood, Mich., have been recovered. Two more are still buried under the debris in the mine.
- One man was killed and six others seriously but not fatally hurt in the crash of a wrecking engine into some derailed freight cars near Binghamton, N. Y., yesterday.
- John Merryweather Tinsley, colored, born in Richmond, Va., July 1, 1783, died yesterday in Toronto. One sister died at 113 and another at 111, and a third is now living in New Orleans.
- Work has been abandoned on the new building in Philadelphia, of the collapsed Order of Iron Hall, owing to the revelations which swept the business of the Order into the hands of a receiver.
- Peter Berthiaume, a fireman, at Springfield, Mass., was shocked to death while making a cut out at the top of a high pole. He grasped both ends of a live wire and received 2,000 volts.
- Lue Ling, a Chinaman of St. Louis, Mo., has mysteriously disappeared, and it is feared that he has met with foul play at the hands of Chinese highlanders for giving evidence in court against his countrymen.
- A freight train on the Missouri Pacific Railway ran through a burning bridge near Council Bluffs, Kan., yesterday. The engineer, C. T. Peffer, a son of Senator Peffer, and Clint Howard, fireman, were both killed.
- Byron F. Lockwood of Jackson, Mich., has sued the Masonic and Odd Fellows fraternities of Grand Rapids, Mich., for \$50,000 damages for injuries he claims to have sustained to character by having been blackballed.
- The grain section of the Toronto Board of Trade has accepted the invitation of the Truck Line Association to send a delegate to the conference in New York Oct. 19 to consider the question of grading Canadian wheat for export, through bills of lading and the storage of grain, and have appointed Mr. L. A. Tilly.
