This is Candidate Cleveland talking. A few years ago President Cleveland was acting. He was turning out Union soldiers and their widows every week. He was not removing Republican veterans to give their places to Democratic ex-soldiers, No; these latter had as little consideration from him as their Republican comrades. It was political heelers and ex-rebels "who had the call" then. Such Democratic Generals as Sickles, Slo cum, John M. Palmer, A. V. Rice, Durbin Ward, Aquila Wiley, etc., had very little consideration from the White House. But one Union soldier appeared in his Cabinet-though there wese two Confederate Brigadiers holding portfolios. The Quartermaster-General of the defunct Southern Confederacy was hunted up and his political disabilities removed, in order to give him the bierth of Euvoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to Austro-Hungary, Daoney H. Maury, a rebel Major-General and a bitter Secessionist, was given the Ministry to the United States of Colombia. Ex-rebels of various ranks were appointed Ministers to Bolivia, Brazil, Mexico, Persia, Roumania, and Venezuela; and the same partiality for those who had borne arms against the Government was displayed in all the appointments. The section of the Revised Statutes of the United States giving preference to honorably-discharged sol and sallors of the Government for all offices and employment was a dead letter from March 4, 1885, to March 4, 1889, when Grover Cleveland gave way to Benjamin Harrison.

The victim was beyond reclamation, and we do not hear that the mob of executioners have been called to account. We suppose it will be charged up as another miscarriage of justice, and the men who could not wait for the slower and more certain process of law will be excused on the ground that human udgment is fallible.

The California murderer was sensiote. His taking off was not sensible. The man was a ward of justice, and chould have been sacred from the profanation of violence. Though he at'mitted his guilt he had a right to arraignment and trial, and as he deserved hanging, his right to be turned off in a legal manner cannot be questioned. The law's delays are many and not always tolerable to the impatient. But in this case there was no reasonable question of justice at the end. The people of California should make it appear that such anticipating of justice cannot be allowed to go unrebuked. The fifteen men who hung Smith, after he had thanked them for the short shrift they proposed, should be given the privelege of justifying their rash act.

#### ESCAPED IN THE FOG.

A British Scalar Fired On Without Warning By a Russian Cruiser.

<sup>b</sup> VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 10.—The British schooner May Bell, just arrived from Cooper Island reports an exciting adventure Aug. 29.

The schooner was anchored seventy milles north of Behring Island In a dense fog whith lifted suddenly, revealing a Russian orulaer a short distance away.

The latter made no signal and lowered no houts, but simply sent a shot across the schouner's bows which missed the rigging only by a few feet. The Indian crew in terror helsted all

Dublin is in the deepest mourning. All the municipal buildings are draped in black. Clubs, hotels and private houses, with but few exceptions, have shown signs of mourning. Many of them have bung out Parnell's picture framed in crape. Everybody wears the ivy.

#### HAMBURG HERSELF AGAIN.

Beer Gardens and Dance Halls in Full Blast-Cholera Record.

HAMBURG, Oct 10 -- For the first time since the plague broke out this city has resumed its usual appearance. Music in the streets has been permitted since yesterday noon and dancing in the dance halls began last evening. Everybody except the unemployed has been in the bear gardens or ou the promenades and the attendance at church services is again falling to its normal size.

Up to last night 2,500,000 marks had been contributed to the relief fund. Several persons have been caught collect money ostensibly for the relief fund, solicitations from house to house. They have been imprisoned for awindling and warnings against other such collectors have been insued by the relief committee.

The number of fresh cases yesterday was 81; of deaths, 7; of burials, 182. In Altona there were five fresh cases and four deaths

DAHOMEYANS RETREATING.

Defeated With Heavy Loss By the French Troops in Duzon Pass.

PARIS, Oct. 10 .--- Colonel Dodds, who is commanding the expedition against Dahomey, reports that one of his parties of skirmishers was attacked on Oct. 6, but the main body repulsed the enemy, with heavy losses. The French lost four Europeans and three natives, and eight Europeans and fourteen natives were wounded.

A fresh column crossed the Duzon Pass. The battle lasted for several hours, when the French were victorious and carried the intrenchments at the point of the The French total losses were bayonet. five killed and twenty wounded. The Dahomeyans established four lines of defense, two of which have fallen into the hands of the French.




