DEMANDING HIS RECALL

Newspapers at Three Rivers Want Col. Smith Removed.

THE VICE-CONSUL MAKES A REPORT

He is Ill from the Result of Having His Windows Broken by the Indignant Citizens—The Clergy Also Incensed at Some of His Utterances.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—Col. Nicholas Smith, the American Vice-Consul at Three Rivers, is confined to his bed with a severe cold as the result of exposure, through having the windows of his house broken by indignant citizens because of his sweeping condemnation of the sanitary condition of the town.

Col. Smith, in an interview, states that he has made an official report of what has happened to the authorities at Washington.

Myron Norman, of Three Rivers, says that policemen are still under orders to particularly look out for and prevent any further manifestation of violence toward the American Vice-Consul, but no farther trouble, he thought, would take place.

The French press is mute on the subject and does not offer any denial of Col. Smith's charges. The English newspapers, however, all refer to the matter editorially, and demand the Vice-Consul's recall.

"The Witness" says: "One sentence in Vice-Consul Smith's report upon the sanitary condition of Three Rivers is a falsehood. It gives the spirit of the whole document a malicious tenor. He described the cholera as riding at anchor upon our seaboard. There has not been a case of it in Canadian waters, and, on the other hand, it has had its home both at anchor and on shore in the jurisdiction of New York for weeks.

"The dignified proceeding for Three Rivers is to meet each statement made by Vice-Consul Smith with a direct denial if it can. It will then be time to ask for his recall, if, indeed, there is not sufficient ground for that in his utterance as to cholera on our seaboard. That is a slander upon our whole Dominion.

In the absence of Consul-General Knapp, Patrick Gorman, United States Vice-Consul at Montreal, has left for Three Rivers to consult with Col. Smith and to hold an investigation.

A despatch from East River states that Archbishop Laflèche, as well as the entire clergy of the diocese, are much incensed over what they term Col. Smith's diaphanous reference to the church's position in times of epidemics. This part of the Vice-Consul's report will form the text for a lengthy pastoral letter shortly to be issued.

FESTIVITIES IN PHILADELPHIA.

Catholics Celebrate the Discovery of America By Columbus.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—The Catholic Columbian Centennial parade of the boys of the Catholic institutions of Philadelphia was a big success.

Over 8,000 gaily uniformed lads were in line. Each organization was headed by a band.

In addition to the hundreds of banners and standards carried at the heads of the different bodies every boy in line carried an American flag.

The parade was a blaze of color from beginning to end.

The line of march was along Broad street to Arch, and thence up Eighteenth to the Cathedral, where the parade was dismissed with a benediction by Archbishop Ryan.

The procession was reviewed at the Catholic high school building, Broad and Vine streets, by the Archbishop and a large number of the clergy of the archdiocese.

The parade at night had, it is estimated, 25,000 men in line, and was the largest and most gorgeous ever given by Philadelphia Catholics.

The Grand Jury has returned three true bills against ex-Fremont Mercey, of Quebec, charged with conspiracy in connection with railway subsidies.

The University of Wisconsin has organized a university extension department under Lyman F. Powell, formerly of Johns Hopkins University.

Hon. James Wadsworth of Livingston County, N. Y., has been nominated for Congress by the Thirteenth District Republicans.

Franklin D. Bartlett has been nominated as Congressional representative by the Democrats of the Seventh New York Congressional District.

The brass foundry of the Cox Brass Manufacturing Company, Beaver street, Albany, N. Y., was burned last night. Loss, \$15,000; insurance, \$10,000.

The Boston Art Commission held a meeting yesterday and considered the question of placing Bayou's statue of Columbus in one of the city's squares. No decision was reached.

Notices have been posted at the Crescent Steel Works on Forty-eighth street, Pittsburgh, Pa., and the Allegheny Valley Railroad, demanding a reduction of 10 per cent in the wages paid to the employees.

The official figures published in Hamburg give the total number of cholera cases in the last six weeks as 17,701, of which 7,596 were fatal. The abatement of the plague has been so encouraging in the last three days that less attention is now paid to it than to the starvation and fevers among the poor.
