Fire Alarm Boxes.

The following list shows the location of the alarm boxes of the Shenandoah Fire Department:

LOCATION.

- 15—Coal and Bowers streets.
- 16—Bowers and Centre streets.
- 24—Bridge and Centre streets.
- 25—Main and Centre streets.
- 34—Main and Poplar streets.
- 35—Main and Coal streets.
- 42—Gilbert and Centre streets.
- 43—Gilbert and Cherry streets.
- 52—Chestnut and Coal streets.

To sound an alarm open the box, pull down the hook once and let go. When an alarm is sent in the fire bell will sound the number of the box and repeat the alarm four times.

HOW TO LOCATE ALARMS.
If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike once, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.

MOCK ELECTION.

Instructive Meeting of Washington Camp 112 Last Night.

The members of the above named Camp held a mock election under the Baker ballot law in the camp room last night. The room was arranged with booths and other furnishings in exact counterpart of the regular voting places. The attendance was very large and among those present were members of Camp 72, Delano; 235, Lost Creek; 167, Mahanoy City; 306 and 183, of town; 125, Girardville, and 75, St. Clair. The visitors numbered about 100.

The officers of the election were F. C. Reese, Judge; S. L. Brown and S. W. Yost, Inspectors; G. L. Hafer and B. F. Parrott, Clerks; William Buchannan, Constable; Walters, J. H. Kester, Prohibition; E. A. Doherty, Democrat; James R. Lewis, Republican. Before the election Mr. F. C. Reese explained the method of making nominations, giving the percentage of vote required, and fully explained all points in reference to the ticket, first explaining how to vote a straight ticket and then a mixed ticket. He also explained the duty of the voter from the time he first enters the room until he casts his vote. Many technical points were presented during the voting period, but Mr. Reese answered all satisfactorily. The visitors went away possessed of some very good points. Mr. Reese has been requested to give a recital of the ballot law and conduct mock elections before other camps.
