HOME INDUSTRY.

As the public of Shenandoah knows well the HERALD has objected to the public water works scheme from the start for reasons which have been stated so often that it is not necessary to enumerate them here, but now that a majority of the Borough Council has awarded the contract for the works and the contract is conditional (that in case the special election is declared illegal, or that the works should be permanently enjoined for any other reason, the borough should not be held liable by the contractors for breach of contract, we must bow to the inevitable. We still agree with Solicitor Pomeroy in the opinion that it would have been better not to award any contract until the litigations had been disposed of, but we are satisfied that the contract which the borough is to have placed in writing is the best could be made under the circumstances and Messrs. Quinn and Kerns are the parties that should have received the contract. It is true that the bid of these gentlemen was the highest, but the difference between them and the lowest bidder was not sufficient to warrant Council in overlooking the probable expense that would be entailed in causing searches to be made at distant points into the standing of sureties if the contract had been given to parties outside of the county, and the expense Council would be put to in enforcing its rights if there was a breach of contract by outside parties. Messrs. Quinn and Kerns, so far as we have been able to learn, are competent and responsible business men of Pottsville. They are right home with us and if they fail to toe the scratch their security will be within easy reach. Council has practically acted upon the theory of encouragement to home industries and we think they have acted wisely.

Cruiser No. 6 to be Called Olympia. WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Secretary Tracy has decided to name cruiser No. 6, now being built by the Union Iron Works at San Francisco, the Olympia, after the capital of Washington. The vessel is a twin-screw protected cruiser of 3,500 tons and will carry engines of 18,000 horse power giving her a speed of eighteen knots an hour. She is expected to be launched early next month.

SIX MINERS ENTOMBED

Fatal Explosion at the Stirling Run Colliery.
ONE KILLED, FOUR SERIOUSLY HURT.

Eight Were Imprisoned—Two Rescued, More Dead Than Alive—The Others Believed to be Doomed Because of the Presence of "Black Damp."

SHAMOKIN, Pa., Oct. 14.—By an explosion of gas in the Stirling Run colliery one and a half miles from here yesterday, six miners were entombed, four seriously injured and eight imprisoned.

Two of the latter were rescued at 10 o'clock last night. The colliery is operated by the Philadelphia & Reading Coal and Iron Company. Patrick McDevitt and Charles Belovage, who were rescued, are in a critical condition. The others are believed to be doomed because of the presence of great quantities of "black damp."

DEAD. Thomas O'Hara.
INJURED. Daniel Reel, driver; skull fractured, burned and cut; will probably die. Samuel Rogers, loader; cut and bruised. Horace Price, door boy; fearfully cut and mangled. Wm. Black, driver; mangled and cut.

ENTOMBED. Samuel Collins, Joseph Kelsch, Joseph Milnecock, Isaac Donney, Michael Wetchock and Benjamin Thomas. O'Hara was married, as were also Thomas, Collins, Kelsch and Milnecock; the rest of the imprisoned men are single.

Yesterday was pay day, and a large number of the men were out of the mine when the accident occurred. The colliery is one of the largest in the Shamokin district, and is owned and operated by the Philadelphia & Reading Coal & Iron Company. Searchers are at work trying to rescue the entombed men.

THE JOHNSONS AVENGED.

Swift Punishment Overtakes the Murderers of Father and Daughter.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 14.—A special from Camden, Ala., says: Messrs. Johnson, aged 17; James Packer, aged 19; Dave Martin, aged 18, and Will Lewis, aged 19, all negroes, who were arrested for the murder of Richard H. Johnson and daughter, in Monroe county, last Friday night, confessed, and yesterday a posse of citizens started with them to the scene of the crime. Last night, hearing of their coming, a mob of excited people, white and black, collected, met the posse in the woods and overpowered them. The report says the murderers were shot and their bodies burned by the mob. They were tried to trees, blindfolded and riddled with bullets. In their confession the murderers said the crime was committed for the purpose of robbery and rape.

Johnson, the victim, was called to the gate and his head split open with an axe. His daughter was then outraged and murdered. Both bodies were cremated in the house. The intense excitement that followed resulted in the lynching.

IRON HALL INDICTMENTS.

The Officers to be Placed on Trial for Embezzlement.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 14.—The Marion county grand jury last evening made its final report and returned indictments against the officers of the late Order of the Iron Hall. They are indicted on a charge of embezzlement. The indictments are joint and are in two counts. The following are the officers named: Freeman D. Soneby, Supreme Justice, Indianapolis; Mark S. Davis, Supreme Cashier, Indianapolis; J. L. Yontaghaband, Supreme Trustee and Chairman of the Board, Detroit; J. Henry Hays, Supreme Trustee and Secretary of the Board, Camden, N. J.; C. E. Thompson, Supreme Trustee, Binghamton, N. Y.; Geo. C. Fountain, Supreme Trustee, Jersey City, N. J.; E. W. Rouse, Supreme Trustee, Baltimore, Md.

Iowa Town Wiped Out By Fire.

SALIX, Ia., Oct. 14.—This village, having 500 inhabitants, was practically destroyed by fire last night. A boy named Jerand dropped a match in an empty gasoline barrel. Four solid blocks of buildings were burned, including every business block in the town. In all about sixty buildings were destroyed. Loss, \$100,000.

Will Pay Postoffice Men by the Week.

MERIDEN, Conn., Oct. 14.—Postmaster Dryhurst, of this city, has decided to have a system of weekly payments among all the postoffice employees of this city. This will be the first postoffice in the country to pay employees by the week. Monthly payments he considers a hardship.
