In justice to the joint committee I must tate that Messrs. John F. Higgins, Councilnen Lamb and Gable, and Mr. Morris, of Jeanesville, last night emphatically contradicted the statement made in the HERALD that the streams the borough laims for the water works have run dry or give any indication of it.

I suppose that the awarding of the conditional contract for the public water works will precipitate innumerable and inexhausti, ble arguments. The legal business will also very likely take a boom,

So far as I have been able to learn Counsilmen Lamb and VanDusen haven't uttered a word about the water works since Council adjourned last night and this leads me to the conclusion that they will eventually wallow the physic and take consolation is the expression, "Well, we will have the water works anyway, no matter who has the contract.

I suppose Messrs. Stout, Van Dusen and action in Council last night so far as the balloting for contractors was concerned, but two very important features of the affair have out me in a quandary. If it was to the interest of the taxpayers of this borough that Mr. Riebe should have been awarded the contract because he was the lowest bidder why did they desert him after the first ballot? Then they found that Stout, Van Dusen and Lamb had flopped. Gable and Holman then shook hands. The former joined the lost cause The latter more wisely "got out of the wet" and recorded his vote with the majority Now, then, if Riebe was the proper man in the first place, why was he not in the second, third and fourth? And if Coons was the proper man in the last named places, why was he not so in the first?
