INSULTED IRISHMEN.

The New York Recorder says it suits Mr. Cleveland's present purpose to rub the fur of the Tammany Tiger the right way, to the end that that noble animal may be induced to do its Presidential purling in his behalf.

Mr. Cleveland had the satisfaction, too, of forcing Mr. Sheehan off the ticket and running for Mayor of Buffalo uncontaminated by association with "that d—d Irishman."

Democrats of Irish birth and descent have made no mistake in classing Mr. Cleveland as one of the Democratic leaders who have no use for them except on election day. He was not willing to have one of them on the same city ticket with him in Buffalo, and he was not willing to give them any place in his gift as President which he could find any pretext for giving to Democrats of his own anti-Irish proclivities.

In a very few weeks Irish-American Democrats will have another opportunity to show how far they are willing to sacrifice their self respect and swallow gross insults in order to promote the success of a party and a candidate whose dislike and contempt for them are matters of history and of record.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

—Mr. Gladstone has arrived at Oxford, where he will deliver an address at the University to-day.

—Ex-Speaker Reed addressed a Republican mass meeting Saturday night at Harman's Blecker Hall, Albany. Fully 4,000 people were present.

—The total registration in the four wards of Waterstown, N. Y., for the first three days is 4,092. Last year for the same period it was 4,018.

—The Danville express on the Chicago & Eastern Illinois Railroad was wrecked in Chicago last evening. Eleven persons were injured and one killed instantly.

—The Troy, N. Y., police are looking for Fred Marks, charged with embezzlement. He left Troy a week ago with jewelry given him to be sold by a Troy dealer. The property was valued at \$1,700.

—William Wattles, aged about 39, of Ithaca, N. Y., committed suicide Saturday night by hanging. His uncle drowned himself recently and one or two other members of the family were suicides.

—Fire yesterday at Jamestown, N. Y., destroyed the Chautauque Lake steamer Jamestown and City of Erie and Mr. Broadhead's naphtha launch. The loss is about \$20,000. Insurance is small.

—John Ford, a keeper at the Philadelphia Zoological garden was gored by an elk last evening and probably fatally injured.

—Francis A. White and C. E. White, of New York, preferred stockholders of the Honolulua railroad, have brought suit in the United States District Court to annul and prevent the lease of the Honolulua system to the New York & New Haven.

—Judge Wilkinson, of Albany, has decided that money found in a bank belongs to the bank, as its proper custodian, and not to the holder.

—Jeremiah Cook and Jane Gleason, of Dutchess county, N. Y., each aged 78, were married at Scituate, Mass., Saturday. Cook is a grandfather, and the bride has eighteen grandchildren.

—Millonire Beckwith, the fanatic, who escaped from Dr. Hitt's sanitarium at Watfield, Conn., a month ago, and for whom it is yet being searched in the woods of the vicinity for the past two weeks, has not yet been captured. The search is being continued.

—George R. Brooks, of Meriden, Conn., has issued a card saying that George Brooks, of New York, who is visiting his brother Harry in that place, is not his son. The father has also disowned his son Harry because the latter said that George was his brother.

PISTOLS IN THE PULPIT

How Maniac Emmons Kept Church All to Himself.

NARROW ESCAPE OF AN OFFICER.

A Lively Time in a Congregational Church at Springfield—Captured Only When He Slept—The Pastor Had Refused to Let Him Preach, and He Was Determined to Be Heard.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Oct. 24.—It is probable that Charles M. Emmons, after his crazy doings of yesterday, will not be put where he can make no more trouble.

The spectacle of a wild-eyed man standing in the pulpit of Olivet Congregational Church, with a cocked revolver in his right hand and another lying on the pulpit, greeted the early arrivals at that church yesterday morning. The pastor, Rev. L. A. Cook, had exchanged with L. H. Dorchester, another city pastor, but Rev. Mr. Dorchester was not able to get into the pulpit, as the madman held it against all comers at the muzzle of his revolver.

He was Charles M. Emmons, a member of the church, and an employee of the government at the United States Armory. Emmons gained admittance to the church at an early hour, and had his position well fortified before any one else arrived.

Around his body he had wrapped a sofa cover and had a black veil over his head and face. The janitor tried to eject him, but as he approached the pulpit the madman fired three shots in rapid succession. All of them lodged in the ceiling.

In the meantime the congregation had begun to arrive, and the news spread throughout the city. In less than fifteen minutes the church had a congregation larger than ever in its history, but all kept at a respectful distance from the lunatic's gun.

Then the janitor, reinforced by Deacon Adams, other church members, and four policemen, re-entered the church, but they were unable to capture the pulpit. Emmons, a revolver in each hand, warned them not to advance.

"Come a step nearer and I will shoot," he said. Several persons who knew him tried to persuade him to leave the pulpit, but he answered their entreaties by pointing his revolvers at their heads and warning them to retire.

The police attempted in various ways to attract the attention of the crazed man, when it was planned to rush upon and overpower him. But this was only the signal for more shooting, two bullets grazing the helmet of the officer who made the attempt.

The officers then held a council, and it was decided that, as Emmons was so well armed, it would be more prudent to await events.

Emmons held the fort until after 2 o'clock, when he fell asleep in his chair. Then Detective Atkins and Patrolman Hayes crept carefully up to the platform and pounced upon him. Emmons struggled desperately but was soon overpowered, disarmed and handcuffed. As they started for the police station Emmons begged hard to be allowed to put on his overcoat. The handcuffs were taken off for this purpose and before he could be prevented the madman brought out another revolver and shot again, but hit no one.

At the police station Emmons claimed that he had been hounded by enemies for twenty years and had written a sermon entitled "The Truth," which he had asked Pastor Cook to preach. Mr. Cook had refused and he had determined to take possession of the pulpit and preach it himself.

Emmons has shown signs of insanity for several weeks, but was not considered dangerous. He created a scene at Trinity Church last Sunday, when he entered the pulpit, sat down and removed his shoes, at the same time ordering all others to do the same, as they were on holy ground. He was removed from the pulpit and the affair was kept quiet. He had a well worn copy of the Bible and the neatly written manuscript of his sermon when captured.
