The Borough Sued. Papers were last night served on the officials of the Borough Council in a suit brought by the HERALD to recover on several bills contracted for advertising the special election held last June to increase the borough debt. 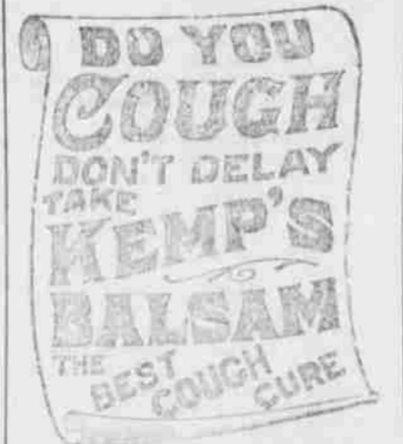

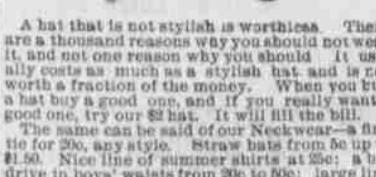
