26—Main and Poplar streets.
27—Main and Oak streets.
28—Gilbert and Centre streets.
29—Gilbert and Cherry streets.
30—Chesnut and Coal streets.

To send an alarm on the box, pull down the hook once and let go. When an alarm is sent in the fire bell will sound the number of the box and repeat the alarm four times.

HOW TO LOCATE ALARMS.

If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike one, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.
