THE DANGER SIGNAL.

We are now within eight days of election. The time has arrived for every Republican in the state to look the situation squarely in the face and resolve to do his full duty on election day. 

NTEREST IN THE EMPEROR'S SPEECH

Mr. Dencon Arrivos in London-Illa Wife Persists in Trying to Compromise the Case-Hamburg and Cholers-Other Late News by Cable.

BERREN, Oct. 31 .- The speech of Emserve William at the Wittenberg celebration to day is to be of a politico-religious nature. It will touch gingerly on the relations of Church and State, and will surpliasize his opinion that evangelical monarchs, notably of the House of Liobenzollern, have always made the protection of religious liberty and the toleration of heterodoxy one of the most conspicuous features of their domestic poli-

Should the Emperor make the lastmentioned avowal unequivocally, he will discourage the Lutherau zealots who are trying to drive Professor Harnack from his chair of theology in the Berlin University, because he does not believe in the Immaculate Conception.

Immaculate Conception.

The city of Wittenberg has been decorated magnificently in honor of to-day's anuiversary. Triumphal arches have been erected at the Elster Thor and the Augusteum, the Collegian Strasse.

Luther's house, Melancthon's house, the Electoral palace, the infantry barracks, and the whole parket blace are trimmed. and the whole market place are trimmed with great masses of flags and bunting. Luther's bust is in every window,
