An examination of the losses through national banks since they were established in 1863 shows that the annual average loss to depositors and other credit-ors during the entire period has been only ors during the entire period has been duly one-twentleth of 1 per cent. The comptroller of the currency showed in his report of 1891 that the losses by fall trees of private banks throughout the country amounted in a single year—1890—to \$17,477,410, which exceeds by far the total losses by national banks since their establishment in 1865. This shows the con-trast between the condition of the national banks and the private banks of today.

BREAD RIOTS IN SPAIN

Starving Workmen Plunder Shops and Bakeries,

ANARCHY REIGNS IN CACERES

Post Morris Softnes to be Laureate-Swinhurne Will Not be Asked at Present - Restricting Belgian Suffrage-Patron Saint for Americans-Cable Notes.

Manuin, Nov. 4 -Rioters have been in possession of Caeeres, near Trujillo, since Wednesday. The recent rise in the price of bread has caused much suffering among the workers in the cloth, lexther and linen factories.

Yesterlay agitators called a meeting of workingmen in the old town, and some 1,200 men and boys attended it. The speakers urged the people to plunder the shops and bakeries.

The efforts of the gendarmes to dis-

perse the workingmen culminated in a fingt. Three of the gendarines were severely wounded with stones and knives, and eight rioters were seriously injured.
The gendarmes were repulsed, and the

workingmen began attacking the baker-ies. The bakers had barricaded their doors, and in only one case was the barricade forced and the shop plundered. Elsewhere the rioters smashed all the windows.

windows.

Several men were knocked senseless with stones, and two women, entirely unconcerned in the demonstration, received injuries, from the effects of which they will die.

The rioters are still parading the

streets, smashing windows and plunder-ing small shops. They threaten to fire the bakeries. The police have called for belp from Trajillo,


