THE ELECTION BALLOTS.

Arrangements for Their Distribution Through the County.

The County Commissioners have made arrangements for the distribution of the ballots to be used for the election on Tuesday next. The tickets for the county weigh 10,000 pounds. The portion to be distributed in this town, Lost Creek, Brownsville, Wm. Penn, Ellengowan and Jackson weighs 820 pounds.

The Commissioners have arranged fifteen routes and the distribution will be made tomorrow and Monday. The pay allowed the messengers will be \$30 for each trip, which will cover team hire and all expenses.

Routes numbers 4 and 5 will be in charge of Squire J. J. Monahan and William H. Detry, Route No. 4 takes in the four election districts in the three Unions. No. 5 takes in Shenandoah, Lost Creek, Brownsville, Wm. Penn, Ellengowan and Jackson.

The delivery will require considerable time and labor. The Judges of Election will be obliged to personally receive the tickets and give a receipt for them.

A UNITED STATES SENATORSHIP AT STAKE.

Republicans of Pennsylvania Must Maintain Control of the Legislature.

A Democratic Scheme to "Michiganize" the State.

SECRET MEETINGS BEING HELD.

dire Results that Would Emerge From the Election of a Democratic Legislature with a Democratic Governor Already at Harrisburg. Marriott Brosius Sounds a Timely Warning to All Republicans.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 29

The discovery was made a few days ago that Chairman Wright, of the Democratic state committee, was going through the state addressing secret meetings of Democrats and assuring them that there was no doubt of their electing a majority of the legislature if they worked quietly and effectively to that end. Privately, Chairman Wright has been boasting that the next United States senator from Pennsylvania will be a Democrat. He can only base hope in this direction upon Republican apathy or indifference.

To remove even occasion for possibility of a calamity such as this would be, an alarm has been sounded all along the Republican lines. Every citizen is cautioned against flitting away his vote on any side issues or independent candidates.

Great Interests at Stake.

The continuance of Republican control in the United States senate is absolutely essential to the existence of the thousands of industries of the state that are maintained by the Republican protective tariff. The farmer, as well as the manufacturer and the workingman, has a direct interest in the election of a Republican legislature, which will next January elect a United States senator.

With a Democratic governor already seated in Harrisburg, the election of a Democratic legislature would be disastrous to the Republican party as well as to the agricultural, industrial and mercantile interests of the commonwealth. It would mean a reapportionment which would largely increase the Democratic representation in congress from this state. It would mean a restricting of the state that would insure a Democratic majority in the state senate probably for years. It would mean the wiping out of many legislative districts that are now reliably Republican. It would mean radical changes in the whole machinery of the state government in both the executive and legislative branches.

To "Michiganize" the State.

And what else would it mean but an immediate effort to "Michiganize" the state. With absolute power to carry such a scheme into effect, the Democracy would surely be expected to pass a law requiring the presidential electors to be chosen in congressional districts. This they might gain nine and possibly ten of Pennsylvania's electoral votes for the next Democratic candidate for president.

The far reaching effect of Democratic success in the legislative canvass in this state makes it important that every Republican vote shall be polled for the regular Republican nominee for state senator or state representative in every congressional district. There are a number of districts in which hard work will have to be done to elect Republicans to the legislature and to which attention is now directed.

Marriott Brosius' Ringing Words.

Congressman Marriott Brosius, a great favorite of farmers of Pennsylvania, was among the visitors at the Republican headquarters this week. He charted minutely about the situation in the state. He has been an earnest worker on the stump from the beginning of the campaign. This popular Lancaster county representative touched upon the legislative canvass and the importance of political every Republican vote in every close electoral or representative district.

"It will be well for us," said Congressman Brosius, "if we appreciate the point of our position which are most exposed to danger and endeavor to guard them against the flank movements of the enemy. 'The wise man foreseeth the danger and shuneth it, but the foolish pass on and are punished.' Is a proverb most timely at this juncture in the canvass. One of the dangers against which we must guard is an inclination in many good people to take revenge, or administer a rebuke, or gratify a pique, or promote what has been styled 'purity in politics' by cutting a Republican candidate.

If practiced to any considerable extent this may lead to consequences not only not intended, but very much to be regretted. In many sections the sharpest contests will occur on candidates in the legislature, which will elect a United States senator.

The United States Senate Close.

"In view of the extremely narrow margin now existing between the parties in the United States senate, and the possible loss of one or two Republican senators despite anything we can do to prevent it, it is plainly seen by any one at all acquainted with the situation what a little feebleness of attachment to our standard bearers may do. A little misdirected zeal in the prosecution of collateral purposes—the expense of the chief objects of all our exertions—the election of our ticket—may result in the defeat of enough Republican candidates for the legislature to enable that body to elect a Democratic United States senator. Thus, in the event of Democratic success in the Electoral college, we would not only be turning over the legislation of the state to the Democracy, but for the first time in thirty-two years placing the entire government of the country in the hands of those who are but waiting an opportunity to apply in the administration of government a body of principles and policies which will put in instant peril the great principles which have distinguished Republican administrations, and jeopardize the great American industry and interests which have been the real objects of Republican solicitude to thirty years."

Republicans Should Look Ahead.

"We are all too deeply sensible of the nature of such a calamity to voluntarily

do anything to bring that about. But what we do from the best motives some times, from lack of sufficient consideration of results not so obvious as to be immediately seen, become the very instrument of our own destruction. So the Republican who, for whatever purpose, cuts a candidate for the legislature on his ticket places himself in the position of becoming responsible for the election of a Democratic United States senator, with all the appalling consequences which may ensue from that event.

"I do not envy the Republican who is willing to assume that responsibility. I do not believe there is a Republican who is ambitious for such a distinction, or who would not resent with contemptuous scorn the imputation of such a purpose. It is possible, however, by underestimating this danger, and exaggerating the importance of carrying out some personal slur or satisfying some local purpose, that the very best Republican might unwittingly achieve this unenviable distinction. It is to be put on our guard in a matter of the greatest moment that I refer to this subject, that Republicans, loyal and true to the great party which has shed such a fadeless lustre upon our country's history, shall not, for lack of thought, do that which in its result may be as calamitous as sleeping on their posts, or deserting to the enemy."

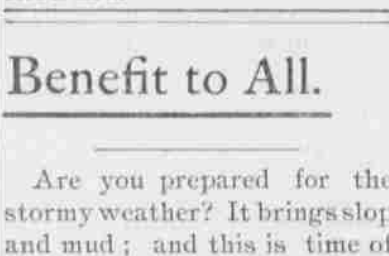
