

# SOLDIERS WILL MAN THE POLLS.

## War Veterans Show Appreciation of Harrison's Patriotism.

### To Labor on Election Day to Get Out a Big Vote.

#### They Will Direct Particular Attention to Insure the Election of Republican Members of the Legislature, so as to Guarantee the Return of a Republic to the United States Senate.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2.—The activity of the veteran Union soldiers of Pennsylvania in this campaign is best shown by the efforts of the War Veterans' club, of this city, and similar organizations throughout the state to get out a full vote for the whole Republican ticket next Tuesday. Union veterans all over the country are taking a deep interest in General Harrison's candidacy. Captain John Taylor, president of the War Veterans' club, has just sent out a



BENJAMIN HARRISON AND HIS ATTITUDE TOWARD THE SOLDIERS.

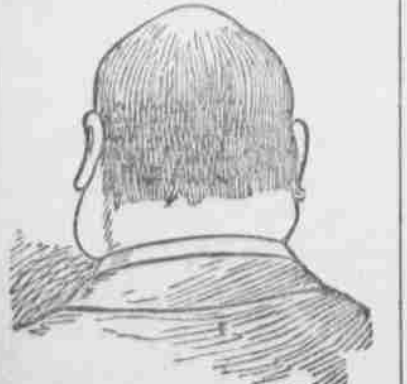
letter to many comrades throughout the state, in which he says:

"We should not be satisfied with the reelection of President Harrison simply. Let us make sure the election of Republican congressmen, wherever possible, also the election of Republican state senators and members of the assembly, for, in January next, the legislature will elect a United States senator. Let us be sure that he is not only a Republican, but a soldier. How can we be certain of this? By turning in with a will, and insuring the election of Republican candidates for the state senate and the assembly in our respective counties. Let us give particular attention to this Pennsylvania is safe for Harrison by an overwhelming majority. Let our special energies among our relatives and friends be given in behalf of the senatorial and legislative candidates from this time forward. We must not forget that there are twice as many 'Rebel Brigadiers' in the United States senate as there are union soldiers. Nor must we forget that if the Republican majority in the United States senate is wiped out—and the senate is now almost a tie—and the Democrats retain control of the house, there will be very little chance for pension legislation for a generation or more.

"Let us turn to, therefore, with a will in behalf of the whole Republican ticket, giving special attention to the candidates for congress, state senate and the legislature."

#### Cleveland's Anti-Soldier Record.

Enclosed with this letter was a very telling document contrasting the records of Cleveland and Harrison towards the Union soldiers. This is cleverly done by means of the "deadly parallel column." In the first column Cleveland is represented as turning his back toward the soldier. Following is his "war record," in which it is stated that he was an able bodied man when drafted, but served his country by a substitute, whom he permitted to die in a poisonous hospital. He never visited the army in the field or hospital, where a sick or wounded soldier lay, to offer his sympathy or aid. He never contributed a dollar to the sanitary or Christian commission. While governor of New York he vetoed a bill to punish dead beats and beggars, who were never soldiers, for wearing G. A. R. badges. As president, he vetoed 324 pension bills, which was

more than were vetoed by all the presidents who preceded him in the White House. It remained for Cleveland to be the first president to fill his veto messages with jests and sneers at the men who saved the nation. General Harrison's brilliant war record is given in the adjoining column. Early in the war he raised a regiment, and was its colonel. Colonel Harrison was a disciplinarian, yet his men loved and honored him. His sympathy with the sick and dying was deep and sincere. He was generous. No soldier made him flinch. His regiment shared his courage, and made for itself a lasting fame. Harrison's noble record as president is then given. During the fifty-first congress he approved 1,607 private pension bills, many of which had been vetoed by Cleveland. He also approved the dependent pension bill (vetoed by Cleveland), which a Republican congress had re-enacted at the request of the Grand Army of the Republic.

### CLAIMS OF BOTH SIDES

#### Republicans and Democrats Name States Hoped For.

### LITTLE BETTING IN WASHINGTON

#### Backward About Wagering on the General Result—Government Employees Leaving the Capital for Home—Governor Flower Issues a Proclamation Regarding the Election.

New York, Nov. 5.—Both camps of the national parties are now figuring on what States they expect to carry. The lines are now definitely drawn, and there will be very little fighting between now and next Tuesday. The main thing will be to perfect the plans already made.

The following is said to be the table of Republican expectations:

- Alabama, 11; California, 9; Colorado, 4; Idaho, 3; Illinois, 24; Indiana, 10; Iowa, 13; Massachusetts, 15; Michigan, 8; Minnesota, 9; Nebraska, 3; New Hampshire, 4; New York, 30; North Dakota, 4; Ohio, 23; Oregon, 4; Pennsylvania, 32; Rhode Island, 4; South Dakota, 3; Vermont, 4; Washington, 4; West Virginia, 6; Wisconsin, 12; total, 254.

It will be noticed that the States of Nevada and Montana do not appear in this list.

Chairman Carter says he is confident of the result. Joseph H. Manley says the Solid South is sure to be broken.

A member of the Democratic National Committee said this morning:

"We expect to carry the Solid South with its 159 votes, New York 30 votes, Indiana 15, New Jersey 10, Connecticut 6, Michigan 6, Wisconsin 12. Total, 244."

The Democrats likewise leave out of their table Nevada and Montana. Thus both of the parties consider that those States are doubtful ones. This is about all they will admit. Their united claims, it will be seen, amount to 493 votes, 51 more than there are in the college.

The Democratic Committee said they were prepared to stand by the table they issued. He said the entire committee had confidence in the result as there laid down.

### GOING HOME TO VOTE.

#### Government Employees Leaving Washington in Large Numbers.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—There was a very general clearing out of government employes from the Executive Department to-day for the far western States to vote at the approaching election, and to-morrow will witness the departure of several thousand for points in the eastern States and in the south.

It is estimated that 8,000 voters will leave or have left the District of Columbia to exercise the right of suffrage.

Both of the great political parties are very active here in sending voters home and committees are scouring the city in search of voters.

The Democrats are very active as to New York voters and to those who vote in the adjoining Congressional districts of Maryland and Virginia, several thousand of whom are engaged in business here.

Acting Secretary Spalding left for Michigan to vote at the general election. Assistant Secretary Nettleton is acting Secretary of the Treasury.

Most of the big guns now here will get away by Monday.

### BETTING IN WASHINGTON.

#### Comparatively Little Being Done—Harrison a Slight Favorite.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—There is comparatively little betting here, and what little there is gives Harrison the preference, the general ratio being 10 to 8 on Harrison for the general result. There is a marked shyness as regards the success of either candidate in Indiana or New York. Andy Utson holds \$10,000 that he will bet on Harrison in a jump or paroled. D. D. Rogers will bet anything from \$1,000 to \$10,000 on Harrison's re-election.

A leading New York bookmaker put up \$10,000 here on Harrison during the two weeks of the Ivy City races, but was finally compelled to take his money back with him, as he could find no takers save for insignificant amounts.

Some few bets of \$500 and \$300, even money on the general result, have been made, but as a general thing, there is less betting this year than ever before.

### Gov. Flower's Proclamation.

ALBANY, Nov. 5.—Gov. Flower has issued a proclamation calling upon all election officers, all district attorneys, all sheriffs, and all peace officers to see that the laws of the State are rigidly enforced, to the end that good order may prevail at the polls, and the right of honest franchise be sacredly guarded; and he gives warning that all failures on the part of such public officers to discharge their full duty in the complete enforcement of the laws shall be considered sufficient cause for their removal.

### Craged By Remorse.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 5.—It is reported that A. W. Bennett, whose alleged negligence in delivering an order caused a railroad collision here a few days ago, in which two persons were killed, has been crazed by remorse, and is now wandering in the woods a raving maniac. The coroner's jury held him responsible for the collision. He is 69 years old and has a wife and family.

### Mr. McLeod in Boston.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—President McLeod, of the Reading Railroad, arrived in Boston last evening. It is said that he will make a thorough inspection of the Boston and Maine property, and will spend several days in going over the road.

### Treasurer Department Statement.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—A statement prepared at the Treasury Department shows that there is now circulated \$65,673,000 of one and two-dollar U. S. notes. In 1881 the amount was \$45,000,000 when it ran down to \$35,000,000.
