### DOWN TO BUSINESS.

#### Active Work by the Soldiers' Monument Committee.

A meeting of the Soldiers' Monument general committee was held in the Council Chamber last evening, Chairman James presiding. Several new societies were represented, but the attendance was not up to the desired mark, and some of the delegates stated that a large attendance could not be expected until after the election.

Mr. S. A. Beddall reported for the committee on site, in the absence of Hon. M. P. Fowler, and stated that the committee had decided to recommend a site at Centre street and Market alley. The committee received the report and placed it on file for further consideration, the idea being to defer definite action until more representatives will be able to attend.

Among the new representatives at the meeting were John Wagner, of the German Red Men; P. D. Holman, Knights of the Golden Eagle; George L. Halper, Camp 9, P. O. of T. A.; and P. H. Hopkins, Sr., Hope Section, No. 10, J. T. of H. & T.

Mr. S. A. Beddall said he thought the parties who intend to contribute to the monument should begin making their payments and be backed up by his opinion by laying a 20-dollar gold piece before the secretary as his personal contribution. He said he would not pledge himself not to give more.

On motion, it was decided that all contributions for the monument fund be paid to Mr. H. E. Dugler, the secretary of the committee, who will turn over all receipts to the treasurer, Mr. S. A. Beddall.

The committee decided to meet again on Tuesday evening, November 18th, 1892, by which time it is hoped that all representatives will have instructions on the question of sites.
