**Cleveland's Plurality in the Electoral College Will Be at Least 266.**

OHIO AND CALIFORNIA CLAIMED BY THE DEMOCRATS.

RESULT DOUBTFUL IN BOTH STATES

Weaver, Third Party Candidate, Has 27 Votes so Far and Claims More—His Party Will Probably Hold the Balance of Power in the United States Senate—Democrats Have About 100 Majority in the House of Representatives—Latest Returns from States and Counties.

New York, Oct. 10.—The latest returns do not materially change the result as first announced.

Mr. Cleveland is elected to the Presidency, having carried the solid South and a great number of hitherto doubtful States, as is shown in the table printed below.

The surprise of the day are the possibility that he may have carried California.

Kansas gives her vote to the People's party.

Indiana, Illinois, and Wisconsin are safe for the Democratic candidate.

The Legislatures elected in the various States have changed from Republican to Democratic in such numbers that the Democrats will probably have a small working majority in the United States Senate.

In the House the Democratic majority will not be far from 100.

The majority in New York State is 47,385 for Cleveland. In New York City it is 75,848.

The Assembly is Democratic by 10 majority.

**THESE WERE BIG BETS.**

Some of the Money That Will Now Change Hands.

New York, Nov. 10.—The men who made bets on the results of the election are now looking around for the stake-holders.

Michael Dwyer is said to have won \$75,000. He put up about \$150,000 at big odds to win.

Joseph J. O'Donoghue won over \$22,000. Edward Murphy, jr., wins about \$40,000. Edward Kearney will be \$36,000 better off when he collects his bets. Subway commissioner, Walter Stern captures \$12,500. Bookmaker J. Mahoney made \$25,000.

Eddie Talcott won \$5,000; Louis Bell, \$5,000; Tom Patton, about \$50,000; Ed Stokes, \$5,000; William J. Thompson, \$30,000; Pat Duffy of New Orleans, \$30,000 from President Walbaum of Guttenberg; H. A. Hart, \$15,000.

Dave Martin lost about \$50,000; Bookmaker Wheelock, \$55,000; Billy Edwards, about \$30,000 he held as stake money, and Bookmaker Fred Lowe about \$14,500.

**CONGRATULATING THE WINNER.**  
Mr. Cleveland Receives a Party of Prominent Democrats.  
New York, Nov. 10.—Several gentlemen from the Democratic National headquarters went up to see Mr. Cleveland at his residence, soon after the result of the election was known, to congratulate him on his victory.

**THE NEXT HOUSE.**

It Will be Democratic by a Large Working Majority.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The best possible compilation of the election returns for Congressmen, made up from the latest returns, is presented below.

The returns, as yet, of course, are very incomplete, and changes will have to be made in the figures on both sides, as the later reports will probably show the defeat of a number of Congressmen now said to be elected, and vice versa.

There were in the last House 355 Democrats, 85 Republicans and 10 Independent, or 450 members in all. The result is a relative gain for the Republicans, as compared with the tremendous landslide of two years ago, so that the Republicans will need more than two sides in the national legislative chamber for their members.

But though the Democrats have lost a number of members, as compared with the present House, their majority is certainly large enough for all practical purposes.

The strength of the Independent will be pretty nearly the same in the next House as in this, but they will miss the presence of their two most aggressive representatives, Tom Watson of Georgia and Jerry Simpson of Kansas. "Honest John Davis," of Kansas, will be the leading Third party man in the next House.

**NEW JERSEY.**

Plurality for Cleveland and Wertz—Legislators and Congressmen.

TRENTON, Nov. 10.—Returns up to this morning show that Cleveland has carried the State of New Jersey by 7,149, and that Wertz, Democrat, for Governor, has been elected by a plurality of 4,000.

The next Legislature will stand as follows: Senate—Republicans, 4; Democrats, 17; House—Democrats, 56; Republicans, 25; The Democratic majority on joint ballot will be 31—which leaves a net Republican gain of 4.

**OHIO.**

Result in Doubt—Democrats Made Great Gains in the Interior.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 10.—Returns develop surprising Democratic gains in the interior counties. There is no disguising the fact that the result is in doubt, and that Ohio's electoral vote may be cast for Cleveland and Stevenson.

At present, Harrison has a margin of 700, but there are several counties yet to hear from. Chairman Farley, of the Democratic executive committee, has arrived here, and says he confidently expects that the State has gone Democratic. He does not actually claim it so far. The outcome will not be known to-day.

**Nebraska.**

OMAHA, Nov. 9.—Republicans have probably elected the Governor and entire State ticket in Nebraska, but returns are slow, and the plurality will be small. Weaverites claim the State by a small plurality. Bryan, Dem., for Congress, will not have over 500 majority.

**Wisconsin.**

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 10.—Democratic Chairman Wall says Cleveland and Peck are elected by about 18,000. Returns are incomplete but will not make any material difference in the result.

**PENNSYLVANIA.**

Harrison's Plurality Over 74,000—Republicans Gain One Congressman.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9.—Harrison's plurality in Pennsylvania is 74,755, his majority in Philadelphia being 22,552. The Congressional delegation includes 18 Republicans and 10 Democrats, an increase of one Republican, as follows:

**CONNECTICUT.**

Cleveland Has Over 5,000—Morris Elected Governor—Senate a Tie.

HARTFORD, Nov. 10.—Nothing in the later returns revealed changes the result here materially. Cleveland's plurality is 5,647.

The report that sufficient Prohibition and scattering votes were cast to prevent Morris' election is not confirmed by the drift of the official returns, more than half of which are in.

The State Senate is a tie. The House shows a Republican majority of 14. Lewis Sperry, Dem., is re-elected to Congress from the first district by 547.

James F. Figgott, Dem., is elected in the second district by 2,840. Charles M. Russell, Rep., is re-elected in the third district by 57,772, falling off of 465 votes from two years ago. Robert E. DeForest, Dem., is re-elected from the fourth district by 2,091. The State Senate is a tie and the Republicans have about 20 majority in the House.

**Massachusetts.**

Gov. Russell Re-Elected by a Small Plurality.

BOSTON, Nov. 9.—Gov. Russell (Dem.) has been re-elected Governor of Massachusetts by a plurality of about 2,000.

Incomplete returns gave Harrison, Rep. 131,816; Cleveland, Dem., 122,917; Bidwell, Pro., 4,458. For Governor, Russell, Dem., 124,626; Haisle, Rep., 119,245; Hamlin, Pro., 4,216. For Lieutenant Governor, Carroll, Dem., got 109,424; Walcott, Rep., 109,971.

Harrison's plurality is between 5,000 and 10,000. Returns from the Congressional districts indicate a gain of four Congressmen for the Republicans.

General Draper defeated George Williams in the Eleventh district. Gillett in the Second, Walker in the Third, Cogswell in the Sixth, Lodge in the Seventh, Morse in the Tenth and Randall in the Thirteenth, all Republicans, are elected.

In the Tenth McEttick, Ind. Dem., is elected, and in the Fourth Appleby, Rep., is thought to have defeated Coddige. Crosby, Dem., and Stevens, Dem., are probably elected in the First and Fifth districts, and the Eighth district is won by both McCall and Andrew, with the chances apparently in favor of McCall, Rep.

**Another Record Smashed.**

STOCKTON, Cal., Nov. 10.—The eastern steeple Krumlein, who a few days ago wrested the record from Stamboul, had the record taken away from him by the latter yesterday afternoon. Stamboul went a mile in 2:08 flat. Stamboul went away after scoring three times, and made the first quarter in 39 1-4; second quarter in 30:55; the time at three-quarter post was 1:39; he came down the last quarter strong and game, without the whip in 32 seconds, making the mile in 2:05.

**NEW YORK.**

Latest Corrected Returns Give the State to Cleveland by 44,498.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Latest corrected returns show that Cleveland has carried the State by 47,385 plurality.

Full returns from all the districts in this city give Gilroy for Mayor a plurality over Elmer of 75,848.

The New York State Legislature will be Democratic by fourteen or sixteen or joint ballot, this ensuring the election of a Democrat to succeed United States Senator Frank B. Rowan.

The Assembly will probably be made up of seventy Democrats and fifty-eight Republicans.
