## CHRITCHLOW IN COURT

First of the Homestead Murder Cases on Trial.

PROSECUTION'S CASE OUTLINED truth in the report,

The District Attorney's Address-A Jury Battle Told by a Witness.

HOMESTEAD, Nov. 19 .- The first of the Homestead murder cases is now on trial in the criminal court, and is attracting much attention. Judge Kennedy presides. Critchlow is charged with the killing of T. J. Conner on July 6 during the riots at Homestead.

The prosecution is represented by District-Attorney Burleigh, Messrs. Patterson, Robb, Knox, and Beck, and the defense by Messrs. Argo, of Sioux City; Erwin, of St. Paul, Marshall, Montooth, Reordon, Brennan, and Cox.

Counsellor W. J. Brennan moved to quash the indictment and also the array of grand jurors because the grand jury had not been impartially drawn, as the slips containing the names of the jury were not uniform, those deposited by Judge Slagle being of different size and differently folded from those deposited in the box by the jury commissioners.

District Attorney Burleigh replied that the motion to quash was too late. The defendant had pleaded and had thereby waived any right to the motion. Judge Kennedy allowed the filing of the motion, but overruled it.






