Terrible Deed of an Insane German in Chicago.

HE NARROWLY ESCAPED LYNCHIN G

Hermann Siegler Shot Wife, Mother-in-Law, Father-in-Law, and a Poitceman-Two Dead, the Others Probably Fatally Hurt-An Augry Crowd Attempts to Kill the Assassin.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.-The later annals of Chicago can record no more horrible trime nor one accompanied by more sensational details than that which brought death into a two-story frame cottage in the northwestern part of this city last evening. By the acts of a man, who is said by some to be insane, a double murder was committed, two people seriously if not fatally wounded and the murderer narrowly escaped violence at the hands of a thousand citizens who live near the scene of the tragedy.

Herman Selgier, a German, lived with his wife and three children at the residence of his wife's parents, Henry and Caroline Siles on Paulina street. Nothlng unusual was noticed in his actions until yesterday afternoon, when, gun in hand, he entered the parlor where his wife and children were. One of the little ones saw him first and began to

Mrs. Siles, the mother-in-law, hurried into the room and as she entered Siegler attempted to elevate the gun as though he intended to shoot her. She rushed up to him and throwing her arms about his neck, tried to take the gun from him. He pushed the aged woman aside violently, then he raised the shot gun

violently, then he raised the shot gun and pointing the barrel almost directly against her left breast, fired before she could offer any resistance. She sank to the floor dead. Mrs. Siegler, in the meantime, had carried the children to the house of a neighbor, and on returning encountered her hus-band, who fired at her, several of the shot taking effect to her neck and broads




